Communist Threat Reported Past

MONTREAL, Jan. 9.-(CP)-Premier Maurice Duplessis declared today the danger of Communism is past in Quebec Province, where the threat of subversive teachings brought warnings from the Roman Catholic Church and a special act known as the "Padlock" Law from the provincial legislature. He made this declaration in a luncheon address before the Canadian Club here - highlight of a busy day during which the Premier held his weekly press interview and later had private discussions with Hon. Gordon Scott of the Protestant Committee of the Quebec Council of Education and Charles Vining of the newspaper Association of Canada.

New "Diamond Horseshoe" Dazzles Rialto

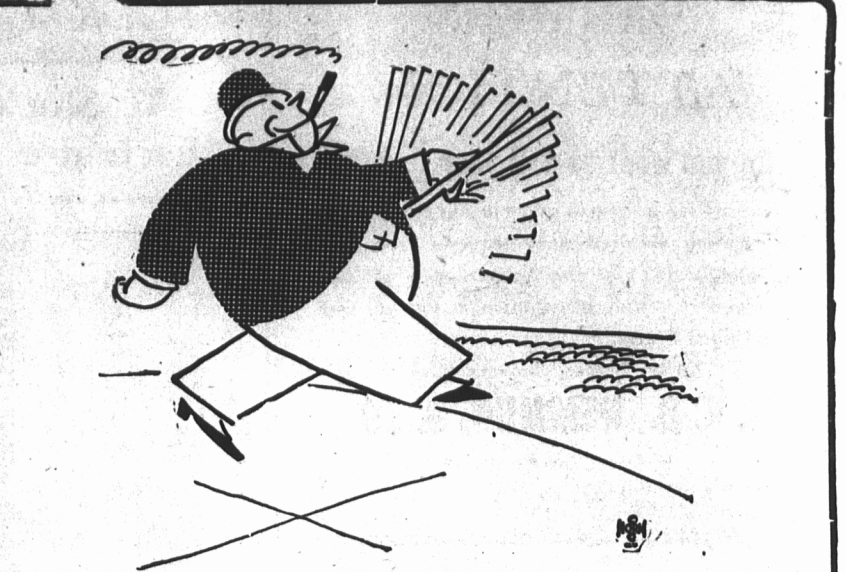

NEW YORK, Jan. 10 - First Nighters: Unprogrammed excitement highlighted the opening of Billy Rose's new Diamond Horseshoe when Eleanor Holm nearly sustained cuts and lacerations while christening the cafe with a quart bottle of champagne. In a room regal crimson, the ubiquitous Rose has brought back (alive) the plush days of Rector's, Steve Brodick's, the earlier and more glorious Polles and Delmonico's. On a unique stage over a horseshoe bar are reincarnated the New York immortals: Diamond Jim Brady, William Hall and Anna Held (who is shown in her milk bath). In fineries that reflect the colorful mauve decade, a dozen American beauties parade the stage. Rose's composition "Wonder Who's Kissing Her Now" (he's 70) and Fritz Scheff, the unforgettable heroine of "Mlle. Modiste." On the pulsations of the Horseshoe a Viennese orchestra that plays only waltzes and takes turns with Noble Sissle who is the best-loved songsmith from Harlem. So, no wonder that the elder folk who came to that particular premier were not ashamed to be demonstrative.
When the good old days were brought back and no wonder that Orson Welles, who is younger than we are, and who sat to the right of us, splintered two nose-makers which he waved away for applause. We think the Diamond Horseshoe is one of Broadway's brightest booms; to be seen by New Yorkers and all visiting firemen.

CRITICS' SECOND GUESS

The footlights' first night has occurred with usual holiday bonifantism. But the two shows that evoked lasting attention are Philip Barry's play, "Here Comes the Clown" and a revival of the late Sutton Vane's great play, "Outward Bound."
Now the Barry play has been the vortex of controversial chatter. It seems that the critics were puzzled by it the first night and therefore greeted it lukewarmly. Then they tried to see it a second time and found in the show greatness they had missed in the original visit. The result of their changing opinions has been an overwhelming publicity in the theater columns.
"Outward Bound" was first shown in New York a decade and has since and is remarkable that in the current revival, which is being performed by Laurette Taylor and Florence Reed, among other famous players, there is no trace of antiquity. For the drama of "Outward Bound" and the message it conveys, seem as alive to-day as they did in the 1920's. When a drama can repeat its success longer after its original triumph, it must possess permanent qualities.

WON BY A NOSE

It was Katharine Roberts who wrote an article saying that, as far as she knew, Madeleine Carroll was the only glow girl ever presented at the Court of St. James. Her statement was instantly refuted by various champions of other stars and it was brought out that Mary Pickford once had curled before Queen Mary, now Queen Mother of the British Empire.
And as that story is told, it seems that Miss Pickford, with customary diligence, had roughed her lips for this important occasion. As her turn approached, she realized one glaring fault in her toilet - her kiss would stain the royal glove. She had neither time to flee, nor opportunity to remove the rouge where she stood. So she compromised by lightly pressing the tip of her nose to the extended hand.
In this, as in countless other movie situations, presence of mind saved our American Mary - not to mention the British Mary's - glove.
