The new plan was designed "to make the best possible use of Canadian manpower."

Two Sections
"The four months' period of training will be divided into basic training for two months and advanced training for the next two months," Mr. King said. "At the end of the first two months of basic training, men will be accepted for the Royal Canadian Navy or Air Force will be withdrawn, and will go to naval or air force schools."

—The others will go to advanced training schools where special training will be given in the paratrooper arm of the service (infantry, artillery, signals, army service corps, ordnance, etc.) to which they are to be posted.
