THE City School pupils marched through the streets, to the sound of their drums yesterday, to the Market Hall to rehearse for the closing exercises which are to take place next Thursday. THE Electra arrived late Wednesday night from Eastern Island ports bringing 600 cases lobsters, 240 cases eggs, 30 bags potatoes etc. She cleared yesterday afternoon with a general cargo. Miss Katie Gay of Pownal returned home from Mt. Allison college on the 18th in company with Miss Mildred McLeod of Halifax, where she has been visiting since the close of the college. THE case child of abandoning which was before the Police Court was yesterday settled by a satisfactory party guaranteeing to care for the infant. The young man who was being held on charge was dismissed. THERE were about 30 excursionists up West River by the S. S. City of London yesterday afternoon and an assorted cargo of merchandise and lumber. The return cargo consisted of 427 bushels potatoes, 75 bushels quahogs, 65 cases eggs and 41 cases lobsters. THE 4th Regt. C. A. headed by the Regimental Band will parade at the drill hall this evening at 7.15 sharp. At 7.30 the Regiment will march to Victoria Park where the regimental and company manoeuvres will be gone through. All members of the regiment and Band will please be present on time. WENDALL L. It was manufactured by local labor, the cans and cases are made at the factory, where only local labor is employed, the only imported article is the tin.
