New Governor-General Expresses Admiration And Confidence In People Of Canada In Address At Conclusion Of Historical Oath Of Office Ceremony.

QUEBEC, Nov. 3.—Fifteenth Governor General of Canada since Confederation, Lord Tweedsmuir, statesman, soldier and author, was sworn into office here last night in a dazzlingly brilliant ceremony which inaugurated a regime that will continue for the next five years. The Legislative Council Chamber which has furnished the setting for many such functions presented a spectacle appropriate to the event of its color and grandeur.

In the presence of high dignitaries of the country His Excellency swore fidelity and allegiance to King George, that he would "well and truly serve His Majesty in the office of Governor General and Commander-in-Chief of the Dominion of Canada," that he would "duly and impartially administer justice" and that he would serve the King as Keeper of the Great Seal.

LAUDED BY PREMIER

Seated on the throne beneath Charles Huot's famous canvas which adorns the whole length of the chamber wall, His Excellency, garbed in brilliant uniform whose silver epaulettes and sash of the Order of St. Michael and St. George sparkled in the flash of the piercing klieg lights that played upon him, heard himself praised by Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King as a man of high courage and lofty idealism. On behalf of Canada the Prime Minister extended to His Excellency and Lady Tweedsmuir "the warmest welcomes."

"It is a delight to us to welcome, in Canada's newly appointed Governor General," said Mr. King, "one who is already well and widely known throughout our Dominion, and one who is the personal friend or acquaintance of a very large number of its citizens." In reply His Excellency brought "a message of admiration and confidence—admiration for what the people of Canada have done, and confidence in what they will still do."

Partly Delayed

The ceremony attendant upon the inauguration of Lord Tweedsmuir followed immediately on the disembarkation of His Excellency from the "Duchess of Richmond" after a voyage which saw them belated by headwinds and fog. It was dark when the liner warped to the wharf at Quebec, but a huge crowd thronged the dock to extend to the new Governor-General a warm and moving reception. As soon as the gangway was raised from the pier, Mr. King boarded the ship, the first to greet His Excellency. A few minutes later the Governor came ashore. Inside the brilliantly lighted shed a guard of honor from the Royal 22nd Regiment and a company of naval men was drawn up. As His Excellency and his entourage descended the royal salute was given, the soldiers presenting arms. Lord Tweedsmuir walked slowly along the rigid lines of troops, and inspected the guard. This ceremony occupied several minutes.

Rict of Color

Proceeding to a waiting car, His Excellency were then conveyed through the tortuous streets of the ancient capital to the Legislative Council Chamber. This

ENCOUNTER NO EARLY RESISTANCE

Native Soldiers Lead Big Push Along All Fronts In Second Phase of Conquest.

ON THE MARCH WITH THE ITALIAN TROOPS IN NORTHERN ETHIOPIA, (2.00 p.m. Sunday), Nov. 3—General Alessandro Pirzio-Biroli's Askaris, pushing on toward Makale in the second great Italian advance of the Ethiopian campaign, this noon occupied Enda Abbamas.

Thus the main body of native troops gained a commanding position at the end of a fertile, well-watered flat.

By lunch time tomorrow they expected to reach Hauzien and occupy the heights beyond the town.

Native women came out of Enda Abbamas to meet the Italians with signs of welcome.

The blackshirt line of General Ruggiero Santini now stretches from Debra Sion on the trail called "English Street" to a position in advance of Amba Sion, along a looping road which runs from Adigrat to Hauzien.

The blackshirts now are expected to enter Hauzien in advance of the main body of Pirzio-Biroli's Askaris, which is keeping slightly to the south of the blackshirt right wing.

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HOARE PLEASD WITH VISIT

Hears Both Sides Of Italo-Ethiopian Dispute.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—Sir Samuel Hoare, Foreign Secretary, returned today from Geneva, "thoroughly satisfied" with his visit, and "terminating his conferences with Premier Laval of France and Baron Aloisi of Italy "exceedingly fruitfully."

Soon after he arrived at Hendon Air-drome, the Foreign Secretary conferred with Prime Minister Baldwin and gave him a full account of the negotiations on the Ethiopian question.

Sir Samuel declined to be drawn out concerning his talks with Aloisi. He did not want to be either too pessimistic or too optimistic, he said. "I will say, however, it is good to be able to hear both sides of the story. The League of Nations enables us to do this."

The Foreign Secretary likewise declined to elaborate on his views on sanctions. But he did reply thus to the statement that some persons believed penalties against Italy would be futile because non-sanctionists will supply Italy's needs: "A great deal of electioneering seems to be going on with this topic."

POTATO GROWERS ASSOCIATION HOLD ANNUAL MEETING

Mr. E.B. MacLaren Re-elected President Of Organization. Co-operation Of Members Urged By President And Manager.

The annual meeting of the P. E. I. Potato Growers Association was held in Queen Square School Hall Saturday afternoon. The attendance was remarkably good considering the heavy rain and fog which prevented many who planned to attend as it was there was about one hundred present.

The meeting was very appreciative of the assistance given by the government which increased the guarantee of the former government sufficiently to permit the Association to meet the demands of its creditors and thereby avoided legal action against the members.

The retiring directors were: For King's, Mont Anne; for Queen's, J. J. Trainor, and for Prince, Horace Wright. Mr. Annear and Mr. Wright were re-elected. Mr. Trainor, who up to the time of being made sales agent for this province of the Eastern Canada Potato Marketing Board was president of the Association was nominated for re-election but explained that his business connections prevented him from continuing on the board of directors. The vacancy was filled by appointing Mr. Angus McPhee, M.L.A., of New Haven to the board.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Trainor for his long years of faithful service. Mr. Trainor in his reply stressed the need of some system of the marketing of all our farm products that would eliminate the competitive method of selling which in every case makes the farmer the loser. Farmers must unite and do the business for themselves and every farmer in the province should be a party to such an end. The directors appointed E. B. MacLaren president and Horace Wright as vice president.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

"For the past eighteen months," said President E. B. MacLaren, "we had a hard time to keep afloat. At your request the Board of Directors and Managers made an appeal to the members to pay their share of the liabilities. Many paid cash or gave their notes but it was not a quarter of the amount required. We appealed to the late government for a guarantee and they assisted us with our fertilizer and spray materials and ex-

SIX DEAD IN NEW YORK FIRE

Mother And Five Children Are Victims.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—A mother and her five children were burned to death early today when fire swept through a Haesem tenement building.

Fire marshals said the fire was of incendiary origin and a firebug was hunted. The victims: Mrs. Margaret Di Donato, 39; her sons, Alfonso, 14, and Joseph, seven; and her daughters, Santa, 12, Mamie, 11, and Louise, eight. They were identified by the husband and father, Louis Di Donato, who told police he ran panic-stricken from the apartment to seek help at the first cries of fire.

The six victims were trapped in their fourth floor apartment. Spectacular rescues by firemen who clambered up 85-foot ladders saved the lives of another family of three in the same building. About 40 other tenants left their flats by rear balconies to cross over to adjoining buildings and to safety.

Deputy fire chief Curtin asserted the blaze was set under the ground floor stairway by a "firebug." Police believed the incendiary the same one who has touched off about two dozen other blazes in the same neighborhood during the past two months.

3 DEAD IN EXPLOSION

Explosion In Milwaukee Kills Three.

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 3.—Three persons were killed and 10 others injured, one seriously, in a terrific explosion today which leveled a private garage on Milwaukee's south side, blew in the rear of an adjoining house and shook the entire neighborhood.

The force of the blast shattered windows within a three block area, ripped off roofs and threw persons within a block of the explosion to the ground.

Two men, still unidentified, were killed in the garage, apparently as they worked over dynamite. An eight-year-old girl tentatively identified as Patricia Mynarek, was killed as she played in a house adjoining the garage. Her mother, Mrs. Ted Mynarek, was seriously injured.

There has been mild hysteria in Milwaukee during the last week as the result of a series of five bombings of public buildings.

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Restoration Of Greek Monarchy Is Assured

ATHENS, Nov. 3.—An overwhelming popular majority for return of King George II to the Greek throne he abdicated 12 years ago was indicated tonight in first unofficial returns from today's plebiscite on restoration of the monarchy.

Typical of the general trend was this count from the village of Chalandri, near Athens: For the monarchy, 1,980; against five. The newspaper Vradini said the vote for the monarchy likely would reach 90 per cent of the total cast.

An Associated Press correspondent, visiting many voting booths in Athens, saw not a single red, or Republican ballot deposited. The polls which opened at 6.55 a. m. closed at 5.30 p. m. after the dullist kind of a day. Not a single disorder was reported and the calm was relieved only by occasional platoons of soldiers, marching to vote and singing as they went. The provinces also were calm.

Announcement of the official result was expected early in the week.



EX KING GEORGE

Quake Signalizes New Mountain Building Claim

PALO ALTO, Calif., Nov. 3.—New mountain building now in its geological infancy on the Atlantic seaboard explains last week's earthquakes in Eastern Canada and the United States in a theory offered today by Bailey Willis, emeritus professor of geology, Stanford University.

"We are in a phase, which can be dangerous," he said, "but it is a very slow one. There is no reason to expect that earthquakes in the eastern region will differ much in the next 1,000 years from their action in the last 300."

Under his theory there is an earthquake mechanism deep under the Atlantic ocean seaboard which at present distributes the force of shocks of the mountain building over a very great territory. The distribution lessens violence. A different mechanism, he said, explains the violence of shocks in some western areas.
