STOCK NOTES

The Glasgow Stallion Show for the benefit of the many breeders of Clydesdales in this province. The Guardian publishes the following table of prize-winners at this show, as taken from the Farmers advocate of Feb. 29, 1912.

It will no doubt be of interest to learn, that Scotland Yet, the winner of the Gawdor Cup, the greatest trophy of the breed, is the sire of Keppock Prince, a three-year-old stallion owned by W. W. Crosby, Cornwall.

For the Glasgow Stallion Show, February 6th and 7th, there were entered for the six classes of Clydesdale stallions, including champion-ships, 59 horses, namely, 15 yearlings, 9 two-year-olds, 18 three-year-olds, and 17 aged horses.

In the aged class, the awards were: First, Scotland Yet, by Royal Favorite; second, Dunure Footprint, by Baron of Buchlyvie; third, Perfection Again, a gray-roan, by Baronson, a grand horse which was the favorite with many.

In the three-year-old class, first was Ascot Chief, by May King, by Baron's Pride; second, Dunure Index, by Baron of Buchlyvie; third, Tullbaridine, by Marmion.

Two-year-old stallions, first, The Dunure, by Baron of Buchlyvie; second, Scotland's Favorite, by Royal Favorite; third, Royal Viceroy, by Montrose Viceroy. Yearling colts were placed: First, Boquhan Magnet, by Aputkwa; second, Dunure Stephen, by Baron of Buchlyvie; third, a bay colt, bred by W. Dunlop, Clun Farm, by Auchenflower, dam by Baron of Buchlyvie.

The Glasgow Premium went to the three-year-old, Ascot Chief, by May King; reserves, the three-year-old Solano, by Garty Pride.

The Gawdor Cup went to Scotland Yet, with Ascot Chief reserve, and the Brydon Challenge Shield went to Ascot Chief, with Scotland Yet reserve.

AMUNDSEN'S DISPATCH TO THE KING OF NORWAY.

CHRISTIANIA, March 9.—When Captain Raoul Amundsen's brother Leon personally took the explorer's telegram, announcing that he had attained the South pole to King Haakon, yesterday. His Majesty was attending the manoeuvres at Sandvikan. King Haakon immediately read the dispatch received from Amundsen at Hobart, Tasmania, and replied:

"Thank you for information. The Queen and I beg to send you and all on board the Fram our most cordial congratulations on this occasion, the results of which are so satisfactory to all of us.

(Signed) Haakon."

This is all the correspondence that has passed between King Haakon and Captain Amundsen.

King George of Great Britain and King Frederick of Denmark have telegraphed their felicitations to King Haakon.

THE GREAT COAL STRIKE—ALARMING SITUATION.

LONDON, March 9.—It was announced last night that joint conference will take place at the Foreign Office, no date was fixed for it.

The effect of the strike is growing increasingly serious. The admiralty has issued orders enjoining the severest economy in the use of coal by the navy.

Precautionary notices have been given the men employed on the railways, iron works and industries of all kinds that employers will be forced to terminate their engagements. Notices have been given to the employees of all the London newspapers in anticipation of cutting down the size of the newspapers, should the strike be prolonged.

SUFFRAGETTES LOSE MANY SUPPORTERS BY RIOTOUS ACTS.

LONDON, March 7.—Public opinion, as expressed by editorials in the newspapers and interviews with various persons, strongly endorses the decision of the government to put down the suffragette excesses with a strong hand.

Inquiry among members of the House of Commons makes it plain that many of them who proposed to vote for a woman suffrage bill which would give women the franchise, will absent themselves from the debate or will oppose such a measure when it comes up. The members who were lukewarm or on the fence, have been driven into the anti-suffrage camp by the latest tactics of the militants.

The majority of the Irish Nationalist members, who usually vote for woman suffrage, are disgusted with the latest antics of the militant. One of the whips of this party declared today that he could name twenty members who favored the suffragists before this week, who would now vote against any bill giving women the franchise.

Many prominent men are out against woman suffrage. Lord Roberts says it would be a disastrous mistake. Mr. Birrell, the chief secretary for Ireland, who was in favor of female suffrage, is now reported to have become opposed to it on account of the window smashing escapades. Mr. Haworth, who was defeated in the polling at South Manchester, attributes his downfall to a reputation of the disgraceful conduct of the women in London in regard to the window breaking. His opponent made a vigorous attack on woman suffrage throughout his campaign.

LONDON, March 7.—The suffragettes resumed their window smashing early today. A number of them assembled in the neighborhood of the large dry goods establishments in the west ends, soon after dawn, and as soon as the shutters were taken down, they attacked the plate glass with hammers. They selected the largest windows in all London for their demonstration.

Passersby detained them until the police arrived on the scene. Six were arrested.

NEW YORK, March 7.—There seems no doubt that at the approaching meeting of the Metropolitan directorate one member of the board, George J. Gould, will withdraw from active competition with the affairs of the Opera House. It is said at the Metropolitan Opera House that Mr. Gould has announced his intention to retire two months ago. No confirmation of an official kind can be obtained from the report that Otto Kahn might also leave the board.

SENATE ACTS TODAY ON PEACE TREATIES.

WASHINGTON, March 7.—The Senate will begin voting on the arbitration treaties with Great Britain and France at 4:30 o'clock today. The first vote will be on the foreign relations committee's amendment to strike out clause 3 of article 3 on the ground that it delegates the treaty-making power to the proposed joint committee.

USED SAFES IN POMPEII.

NAPLES, March 7.—Further remarkable discoveries have been made in the ruins of Pompeii. The excavators have come upon several balconies, one of which, the first to be unearthed, is complete. Five skeletons have been found. Apparently they are the bones of natives overcome while attempting to escape from the eruption.

A most interesting discovery is that of a complete wine shop, with bronze and glass amphorae, or jars, bronze lamps and an ivory safe, which contained a quantity of silver coins. Many frescoes and an electoral inscription have been uncovered.

SAYS COCAINE IS VERY DANGEROUS.

MONTREAL, March 7.—'Twas ever thus! It seems that the nice things are always the worst for us.

This sad product of experience is a good one to keep in mind when one is so unfortunate as to have to take dope.

Dr. Armstrong, of the Royal Victoria Hospital, told the Christ Church Men's Club, last evening, that chloroform is much more pleasant to inhale than ether, but that disastrous accidents sometimes follow its use. Under chloroform one death occurs in every three or four thousand; under ether one in fifteen or sixteen thousand.

Dr. Armstrong condemned cocaine as a local anaesthetic, saying a number of deaths had followed its use in this way. Eucain, stovain, tropococaine, and novocaine especially, had been found more satisfactory.

Antiseptic surgery, said Dr. Armstrong, had been founded on the basis of the destruction by chemicals of all growths in the wound or on the instruments. Now, however, aseptic surgery was the thing. The latter method aimed at preventing any germs gaining access at all.

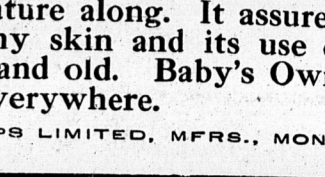
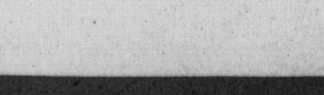
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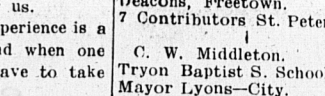
