Stock Markets

MONTREAL, April 1.—Dominion Live Stock with but \$1 cattle, 180 hogs and 37 calves received on the two markets since yesterday, prices were generally unchanged.

Three loads of medium quality of North-West cattle made up the bulk of the cattle offering and these were unsold today. A couple of small lots of medium quality calves were weighed up and the general quotation were from \$6 to \$7 for medium to fairly good kinds. Common calves were quoted from \$5 up. Most of the hogs received were delivered on contract and sales this morning were made at \$13.75 for mixed lots of just fair quality. Better quality hogs were quoted up to \$14. Selects sold yesterday for \$14.60.

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THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, April 1.—There was no marked improvement in the trade volume in Canadian grain in the Montreal market for export account today which was attributed to the fact that few firm bids were received and only sales of odd loads of wheat, oats and barley were made for the April and May shipment. There continues to be a steady demand for ocean grain room and a moderate amount of business was done for both Canadian and United States account at steady rates. The trade in cash grain in the domestic market was slow, the demand being only for odd loads of oats and barley. The local business in car lots was also inactive and prices were unchanged. Prices for spring wheat grades of flour were firmer but no change in value was announced. The demand from the United Kingdom and the continent was again very limited. The movement in winter wheat flour was quiet but the tone of the market was steady. There was no change in prices but United States buyers for bran and shorts in the millfeed market, but as the price bid were 50 to 75 cents per ton below working basis, no business was transacted. The demand for the whole was quiet and prices were unchanged. The demand for rolled oats was quiet. A fairly active business was done in eggs in a wholesale jobbing way. There being an improved demand from grocers and other dealers for supplies to meet immediate wants. There was no change in prices but the undertone was easy on account of the more liberal receipts and the prospects for lower value in the near future. While the undertone to the butter market was easier there was no change in prices, but this is expected shortly. The demand was moderate. The trade in cheese was inactive but prices were firm. The fodder made No. 1 western white and Quebec 20 pound cheese at 24 to 24 1/2 cents per pound and No. 2 grades at 21 1/2 to 22 cents per pound and 24 1/2 pound.

OTTAWA, April 1.—(Eggs) The egg market continues easy with, in some instances, a slight shading in prices. The Chicago market is down 1/2 cent, but this will not particularly influence Canadian markets now as home supplies are sufficient to meet all demands. Toronto extras jobbing 34, firsts 33, seconds 30, Quebec jobbing extras 37 of 38, firsts 35, seconds 34, Manitoba and Saskatchewan market unchanged. Calgary receipts heavier, dealers quoting delivered extras 22, second 17, some storing reported having been done. British Columbia unchanged extras 27, delivered firsts 25, P. E. I. country points extras 30, firsts 27, seconds 23. 400 cases of mixed grades rolling Montreal.

Marion Davies' Best Role Is In "Yolanda"
