**USE FOR KING GEORGE CORONATION GIFT**

Will Found Scholarships to Train Officers in the Royal Marines

LONDON, Sept. 22.—The gift of the "Georges" on the occasion of the coronation of the King is to be used by His Majesty's desire to help the careers of the junior officers of the Royal Marines.

This decision was announced by the Admiralty in a statement reading: "The King having expressed the desire that the greater part of the fund subscribed for the purpose of commemorating His Majesty's coronation by subjects of His Majesty's bearing the Christian name 'George' in all parts of the empire should be invested and utilized for the benefit of junior officers of the Royal Marines who may find difficulty in meeting the cost of the final stage of their military training the following arrangements have been made:

"The sum available has been investigated and the income will be devoted to the institution of scholarships termed the 'King George Prize Scholarships'.

"One scholarship will be awarded each year to the officer in His Majesty's Royal Marines who shall as a result of the annual competitive examination be selected by the Admiralty for admission to the Military Staff College at Camberley.

"Each scholarship will be tenable for two years and will ordinarily consist of half the net income for the year derived from the fund estimated approximately at £37,10s.

The first scholarship will be awarded in 1914.

**GENERAL BEYERS RESIGNS**

LONDON, Sept. 22.—Brigadier General Beysers, Commandant General of the Union of South Africa's Defence forces resigned his post because of his disapproval of the action of British in sending commanders to conquer German Southwest Africa.

**GERMANS ARE ENTRENCHING ON THE SAMBRE.**

LONDON, Sept. 21.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Ostend says:

"The Germans are entrenching themselves on the River Sambre from Mauberge to Namur. I have seen important defensive works at Thuin, Farciennes and Floreffe. Many inhabitants of these places had been forced by threats to perform labor on the works. I have been told that the same kind of fortifications are being erected on the Meuse from Givet to Namur, but it is impossible to cross the Sambre to see for myself. I believe, however, my information is accurate."

**IN MEMORIAM**

**CAPTAIN JAMES A. MCKIE.**

Mr. W. S. McKie received a telegram yesterday announcing the death in Brockton, Mass., of his only brother Captain James A. McKie, formerly of Bay View, New London, this province. The deceased left this province some twenty-five years ago since which time he resided in the United States. He leaves to mourn, his wife and two sons, one of whom, Mr. Cameron McKie is Chief Chemist in the Nova Scotia Steel Works, Sydney, Cape Breton. To the bereaved relatives the Guardian tenders sincere sympathy.

**MR. GEORGE VICKERSON.**

The death occurred at North River, on Sunday, September 13th, of Mr. George Vickerson, at the age of 53 years. He was the son of the late Wm. Vickerson, formerly of North River, who predeceased him eighteen months ago at Chilliwack, B. C. The funeral took place from his home on Tuesday, September 15th, and was largely attended, over seventy carriages forming a procession to Cornwall Cemetery where he was laid to rest. The service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Orman and members of the Cornwall and North River choirs rendered softly the following hymns: "Lead, Kindly Light," "Nearer my God to Thee," and "Asleep in Jesus, Blessed Sleep." He was a man of sterling character, upright and honorable in his dealings with his fellow men. The pall bearers were Messrs. T. P. Cass, Alf. Yeo, John Jewel, James Moreside, Everett Stevenson and Robert McKinley.

**REV. J. W. KIERSTEAD.**

ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 21.—A sad accident occurred on Saturday afternoon, near Lakeside when J. W. Kierstead, senior member of the firm of Kierstead & Mersereau of St. John, was drowned while bathing.

Mr. Kierstead was at one time a minister of the Baptist Church, and held a number of charges, his last being the Tabernacle Church at St. John. He resigned from the ministry of that church to enter business, and was for a time engaged in the insurance business on his own account. He later formed a partnership with C. Jack Mersereau to continue the insurance business and also to do business in real estate and black foxes. This firm organized a large fox company with a ranch in Prince Edward Island.
