

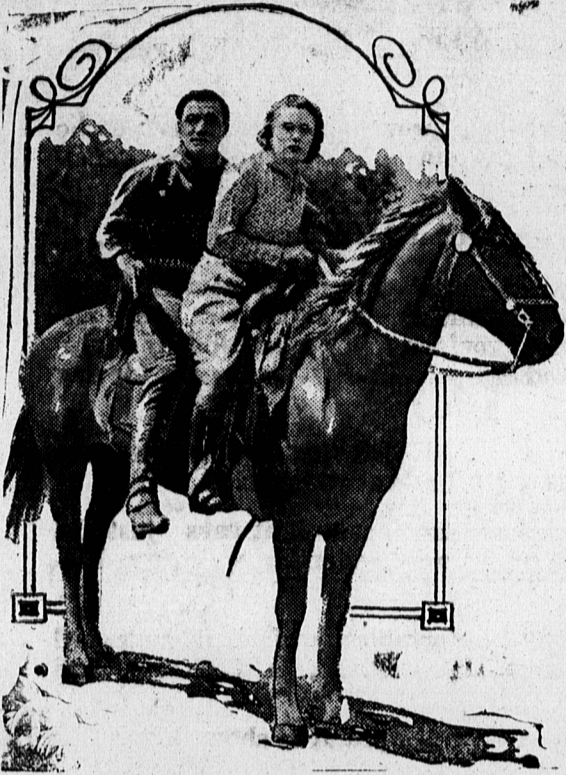

IN MEMORIAM

CAPT. S. E. WRIGHT

Advice from Boston report the death Sunday last of Captain S. E. Wright, formerly well known here as Master of the Steamship Carr oil plying between Boston, Halifax and Charlottetown. Capt. Wright was married in the year 1873 to Miss Mary Ann Cairns, daughter of the late Mr. John Cairns, of this city, who with two daughters Maude and Edith survive to cherish his memory. Captain Wright had passed the great age of four score years and ten.

BERNARD McGUIGAN

Sturgeon parish lost one of its best known and highly respected citizens by the death of Bernard McGuigan who died at his home on St. Mary's Road on March the 11th of the 76th year of his age. Up to about one week previous to his death he had enjoyed his usual good health, being attacked by erysipelas in the head he succumbed in spite of skilful medical attendance and loving care.

As a young man he served several years as a clerk in skippers drug store, remaining in the employ until the death of the proprietor.

He followed the sea for some time and sailed as mate, in the employ of the late Capt. Alward Sr. of Southport, for several years. He was one of the few to be met these last few years who had weathered the August gale in which many a good ship went down. Having always enjoyed good health and being of a light-hearted disposition he was a good companion, a kind neighbour and a true friend.

He always took an active interest in public affairs and during the last ten years he was president of the Liberal-Conservative Association of the 4th District of Kings. He leaves to mourn five sons and one daughter viz Christopher, John A. and Emmet and Lottie on the homestead, and Victor and James C. of St. Mary's Road. His wife and one daughter Mrs. Patrick Walsh of Byrne's Road having predeceased him about four years and two years respectively.

His funeral to St. Pauls Church, Sturgeon, despite the bad condition of the roads was largely attended, the pall bearers being James M. and Thomas Hughes, Bernard McGuigan Jr., Patrick McGee, Terence McKearney and Edmund McGuigan. May he rest in peace.

POULTRY INSPECTION.—The Poultry Division has been carrying on inspection work throughout the province for the past three weeks, with the intention of selecting breeding pens for the present season. Every hen is handled separately and only the choicest individuals are placed in the breeding pens. Care is taken that a good strong male bird is placed at the head of the flock and the inspector makes a report of the flock inspected. This report carries the following information: The number of hens in the pen; the breed and variety; the condition of the flock; the average egg production for the year. This report of the inspector is placed in the hands of the manager of the hatchery in Charlottetown and he contracts with those who have inspected flocks for the eggs needed for the incubator. A list of the inspected flocks can be obtained free of charge by writing the Dominion Poultry representative, Charlottetown.

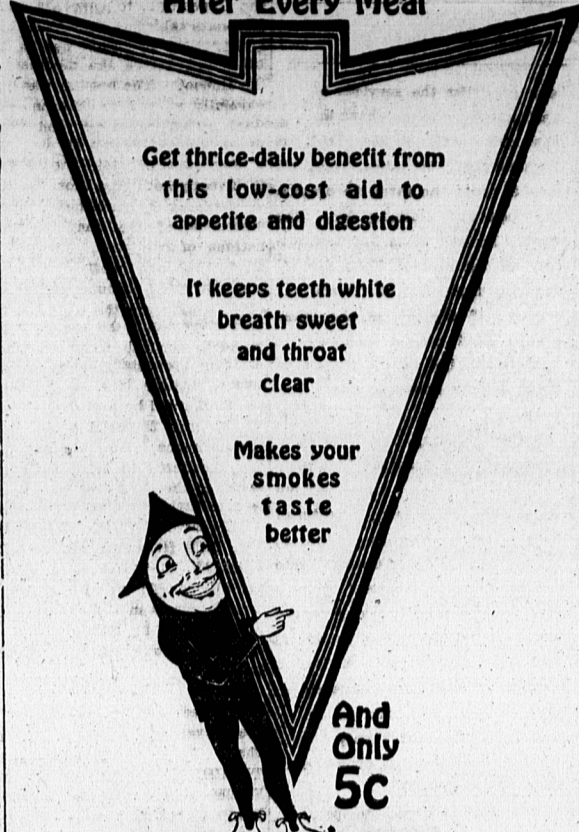

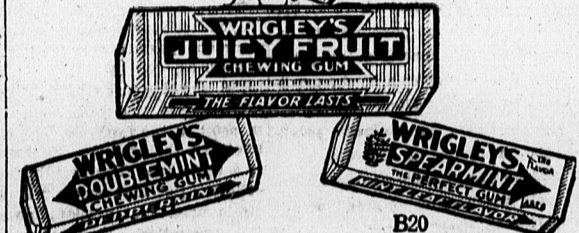

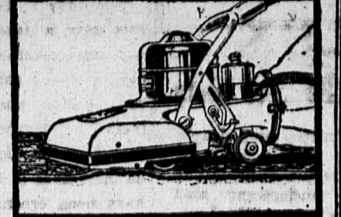
