A GALVESTON despatch says: The body of Charles Coghlan, the actor, which was in the receiving vault of the Lakeview cemetery, was swept away by the storm. To Mr. Coghlan's friends this is the cause of much worry. A force of men have searched the cemetery and the surrounding country hoping to find some trace of the casket, but their search was unrewarded. Mr. Coghlan died at the Tremont hotel, Galveston, on Nov. 27, 1899, after an illness of about four weeks. It was the intention of his widow to have the remains shipped to St. Louis for cremation, Coghlan's desire being to have the body disposed of in this way. The remains were placed temporarily in the receiving vault, it being expected to have them sent to P. E. Island this winter.

PROFESSOR and Mrs Robertson have for their guest Mrs. Alec Tweedie, a well known English literary woman, who is spending a few days in the Canadian capital before proceeding southward to the most fascinating country, the Republic of Mexico. Among the books Mrs. Tweedie has written perhaps the best known are "Through Finland in Carts," "A Girl's Ride in Iceland," "A Jaunt to Norway" all of which titles suggest that the authoress is a great traveller, and that she is not of the order of the conventional tourist. After her visit to Mexico we may hear of another interesting book of travels. Mrs. Tweedie is prominent in women movements in London, and belongs to the National, as well as the International Council. At the convention of the executive of the latter last summer in Paris Mrs. Tweedie was one of the speakers.—Ottawa Free Press.

A few weeks ago a middle aged man entered the grocery store of McKenzie & Nelson, Prospect Street, representing himself as an agent from the wholesale department of Cobb, Bates & Yerxa, of Boston.

When a liberal amount was mentioned, the question was quickly asked: "And have you got it?" "Yes, sir," answered Mr. McKenzie, "but I'm not obliged to pay it until the goods arrive. By this time the stopping station was reached and Mr. McKenzie left the alleged agent in the car, and entered the station, presented his rebate and got a ticket to return and two cents in change, so he made two cents, had a free ride and resumed his work at the store.—Waltham Mass.

W. K. Vanderbilt's Present to the Duchess of Malborough.

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—William K. Vanderbilt has given his check for half a million dollars to his daughter, the Duchess of Malborough, says a London despatch to the World. The gift is in nature of a thanks-offering for the Duke of Marlborough's safe return from the war in South Africa, after about seven months service.

The Duchess, accompanied by the Duke is now in Paris investing the money in antique furniture and decorative articles for the house now building for her in Mayfair, one of the most fashionable districts of London.

The money for the house—another half million dollars—was a Christmas gift to the Duchess from her father.

WANTS A BIG WAGER.

Offered to Bet \$100,000 to \$50,000 on McKinley.

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—Louis V. Bell, of the New York Stock Exchange offered yesterday to bet \$100,000 to \$50,000 that McKinley would be elected. He said he had heard that the Bryan men were shedding tears at an alleged paucity of McKinley money in big blocks, and he thought he would give them a chance to make one big bet anyway. But they didn't come round. Mr. Bell's offer is the biggest single betting offer yet made in the campaign. Cooper, Cramp & Beadleston of the Stock Exchange were exposed yesterday as offering to bet \$10,000 to \$25,000 on Bryan.
