FOG GROUNDS PLANE—The Canadian Airways plane which was due to leave Charlottetown at 5:35 Saturday afternoon to connect with the Trans Canada at Moncton was held overnight on account of heavy fog. The trip was carried out yesterday morning when passengers left for the mainland at 8 a. m. Passenger traffic is reported to be heavy during the past weeks.

Wild Geese Arrive; Horned Owls Hardy

Harbingers of spring in the form of wild geese have arrived in numbers, game officials report. A flock of 11 arrived in Orwell, March 29th. At present the geese are securing food in the open water at the heads of the rivers but as soon as the snow melts the birds depend mainly on the stubble and clover fields for sustenance.

Believe Japs To Seek Peace With Kai-Shek

(By Clark Lee, Associated Press Staff Writer) NANKING, March 31 (AP)—Usually well-informed persons here expressed belief tonight that the new Japanese-sponsored Wang China-Wai regime would be merely a stop-gap through which Japan would seek an ultimate peace with General Chiang Kai-Shek and his Chungking Government. The Wang Government was established Saturday at Nanking, with Japan's approval and cooperation. Persons in close touch with Japanese military and diplomatic officials in China said they believe its days are numbered. Wang himself and his close associates profess to believe that the Japanese army and government will support Nanking to the limit, but realistic Japanese leaders are talking otherwise, even though the Wang regime is but one day old. It is said on usually reliable authority that there is a strong group in the Japanese army which favors a prompt settlement with General Chiang provided the General would agree to accept minimal peace terms calling first, for agreement to participate in the anti-Comintern alliance and to recognize Manchoukuo, and second,

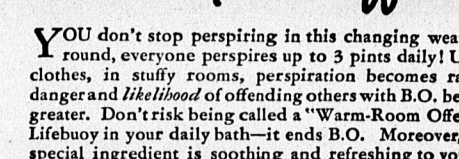

Pound Makes Slight Gains; Dollar Steady

NEW YORK, March 31 (AP)—The pound sterling cautiously fell its way forward Saturday in the foreign money market, trying to make up part of heavy recent setbacks. While the pound gained 1-2 per cent in relation to the United States dollar, a better balance between supply and demand seemed to have been reached for the first time after days of erratic fluctuation.

The Canadian dollar reflected the stability of the British unit and remained at 81.75 U. S. cents (Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.09-9.91 per cent discount).

The French franc added .00 3-8 of a cent to 2.00 3-8. Chief neutral currencies were unaltered.
