w. H. Our students would admire Mr. Miller's (teacher of penmanship) writing and wish they could write as well, but it requires the patience of Job to get them to practice intelligently that they might improve. We have kept up a continual plea for good penmanship, always insisting the best man to be had for that position. The great importance of the subject has at last forced itself upon the public and now that our Chief Supt. of Education is taking a lively interest in the matter, our hands are strengthened and better results must surely follow. Just here I should like to say to the boys and girls attending school, "let the hours devote to the study and practice of penmanship be the most earnest in your school life as they will in this practical age prove the most profitable to you in your later years." In this connection Mr. Miller pays a very high tribute to the late Bishop of Charlottetown for his interest and appreciation of neat work. "His Lordship wrote an exceptionally neat hand for his advanced age, as you can see, and appreciated the same in others wherever found." The sample shown us would do credit to any penman and we hope to prevail upon Mr. Miller to allow us to reproduce it some day in the hope that it may inspire others to greater effort.

In 1885 we find, among other names on the register, that of A. P. McLellan, now Father McLellan of St. Andrews. Mr. McLellan at that time was connected with St. Dunstan's College, and the Bishop "feeling that Eccles also should have some knowledge of business and accounts" placed Mr. McLellan in tutelage for the purpose of afterward introducing a short course at St. Dunstan. Mr. McLellan was a splendid success as a student. His work at the C. B. C. was a success and so much appreciated were his services in connection with St. Dunstan's that he afterward became Rector of that old and honored seat of learning.
