All will join in the hope that the wound referred to will not keep him long away from his humane and beneficent work.

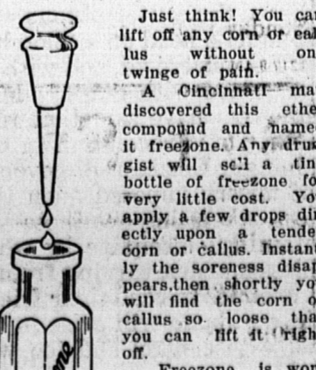
