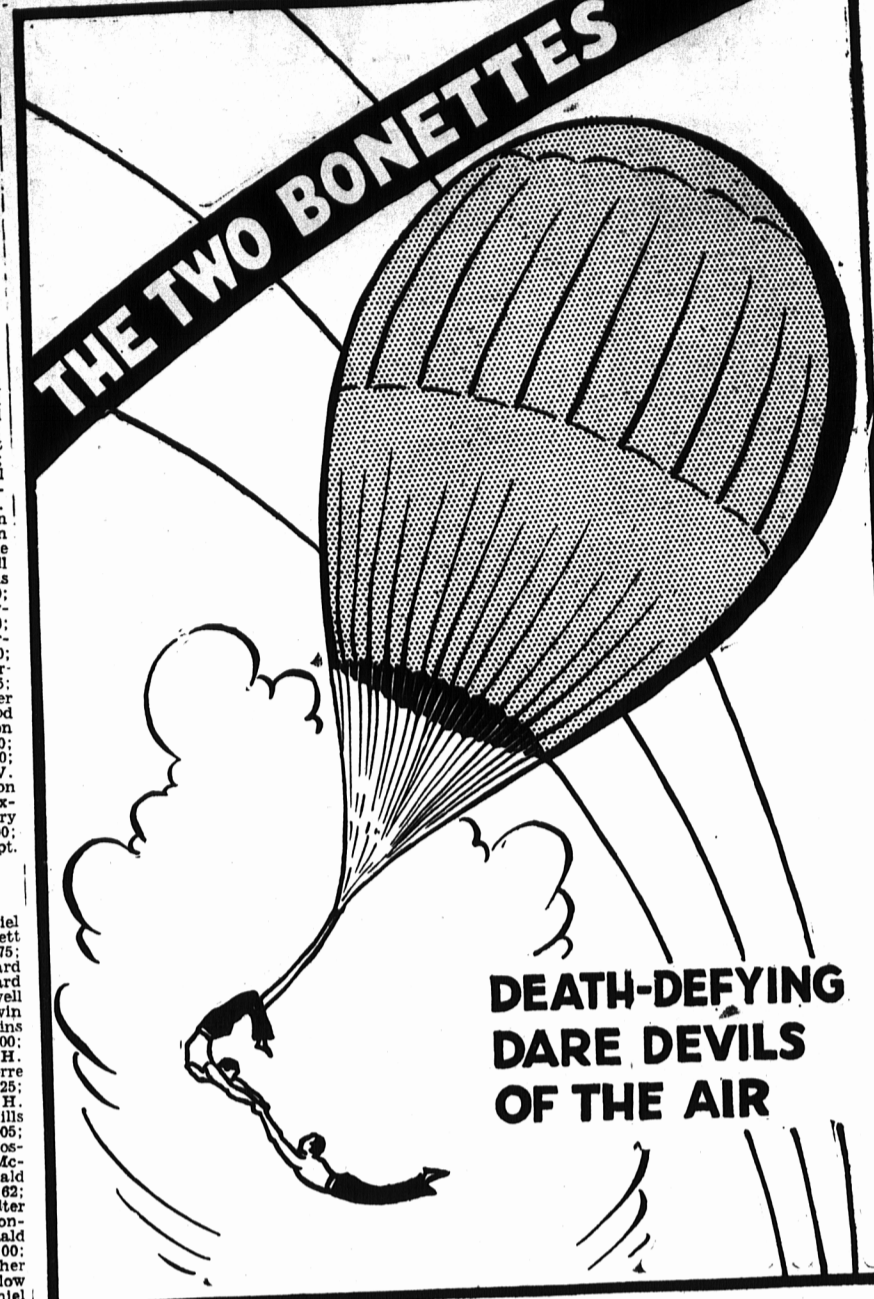

DEATH-DEFYING DARE DEVILS OF THE AIR

One of the big attractions at the Provincial Exhibition, Charlottetown, will be BONNETTE BROTHERS BIG BALLOON. This monster air-bag measures 75 feet by 45 feet and will be flown by Professor C. C. Bonette, oldest experienced balloonist in America, who has more than 4,000 times played tag with death and is still hale and hearty. Professor Bonette is King of Aeronauts and he and his balloon have been seen by millions of Americans. This will be his first visit to the Maritimes and he will be accompanied by his son, Bonette Jr., who claims to be the world's greatest balloon jumper.

The balloon will be inflated at the east end of the centre-field every morning and on or about two o'clock p.m. in the afternoon the ascension will take place, and when it is about one thousand feet or more in the air, Bonette Jr. will drop from the balloon hanging to a parachute by his teeth and doing one of four different stunts. Each afternoon will witness a change of stunt. In the evening Bonette Jr. will include his famous sky ride on a 500 foot steel cable from a sixty foot height, sliding by his teeth through blazing set pieces of fireworks concluding with Niagara Falls spectacle.

Various precautions have to be taken in connection with the balloon ascension. A motor boat will be stationed on the river to pick up balloon, and trucks will be on the roads in readiness to salvage balloon and occupant wherever they land. The Bonette Brothers balloon and sky ride act have been brought to this Province at great expense. It is a real thriller, and to quote from Rhode Island Tercenary, fair management, it was the outstanding attraction there two years ago and brought out the largest attendance in its history at that old New England institution. Land Settlement Is Demanded

GEORGETOWN, British Guiana, July 18—(CP)—Definite action was urged upon the government of British Guiana by the legislative council for action to develop the hinterlands of this British colony. A motion requesting the government to appoint a small committee of the council to consider the entire questions and to recommend the best methods for the economic ex-

plotation of the hinterland's resources was unanimously passed by the council after a motion was unsuccessfully introduced to pave the way for construction of a railway to the hinterland. Hon. Joseph Eleazar of Berbice River, in introducing the motion for a committee to study the matter, declared that the development was not only necessary for further expansion and growth of the colony, but also would provide a means of alleviating the rising tide of unemployment which appeared to be engulfing the country.
