REMINISCENT

Settling the Land Question in Prince County. Organization of Dominion Government. Death of Maximilian.

As everyone knows the principle for the application of which the Examiner and its editor tended was eventually asserted on behalf of the tenancy of this island, and indeed all the landlords, and indeed all the landlords of this island, were eventually compelled to give up their estates in return for money payments loaned to the Province by the Dominion Government.

At the time this discussion was held the new Constitution of Canada was being applied for the first time to the administration of public business throughout the Dominion.

At that time this Island was honored by the presence of several men of genius and among them were two or three who wrote poetry. One of these was the Rev. Dr. Jenkins. The Examiner of this date fifty-five years ago contained a poem by him, entitled "Maximilian." It will be remembered that Maximilian, Arch Duke of Austria was persuaded to go to Mexico as its Emperor. But several of the leading men of that country declined to have him in that capacity. They wanted a Republic of which they should be the dictators and they persuaded the people to rise in rebellion against him.

Deserted by the Emperor Napoleon of France, and others who had been instrumental in inducing him to be ruler of Mexico, Maximilian fled to his guns, was defeated in battle, arrested, tried by Court Martial and shot. Concerning the tragic event our poet of 1867 wrote:

An evil destiny, unhappy Prince, Seduced thee from afar From that abode of love and tranquility rest, Where own grand Miramar,—

Thine through old classic groves bright warbling birds Their tuneful notes prolong Till nightingales at evening's close commence, Their soft delicious song.

Taken and tried—condemned—led forth to die With spirit all unchanged He proudly faced the line of levelled guns Against his body ranged.

The parting gift disposed—one lock of hair, And then, a tear he shed As calling on his loved Carlotta's name The volley laid him dead.

The Examiner containing the lengthy poem in which these verses are taken announced the following marriages:

"On the 12th instant, at Halifax by the Rev. Mr. Gough, George Davies, Esquire, Merchant, of Charlottetown, to Amelia, widow of the late Charles Stewart, Esquire, of Rose Bank, P. E. Island."

And the following death: At Argyle Shore on Monday, the 16th instant, after a short illness, which was borne with great patience and resignation to the Divine Will, Ann, the beloved wife of Wm. McNevin in the 26th year of her age.

Interesting Career of Famous Scottish Athlete

Formerly of the Glasgow Police Force, "Sandy" Cameron Holds Fourteen World's Professional Records. He has many Relatives in P. E. Island

Under the heading "Sporting Feats that have made Scotland famous" in a Glasgow newspaper, an interesting write-up is given by detective Lieutenant P. J. McKay of the Glasgow police, of the career of Alexander Anthony Cameron, who is considered by the authorities the greatest all-round Scottish heavy-weight athlete that ever lived. He was born on March 23rd, 1877 at Loch Treig, Invernesshire and was brought up to the sheep farming life. In his boyhood he met the great Jemmy M'Kee and the kindly advice of this athlete inspired Cameron with a desire to distinguish himself in the heavy events. At the age of 21 he beat several of the foremost shot-putters of the day at Fort William, and the following year he migrated to Glasgow and joined the Patrick Police Force where he improved tremendously in the Police gymnasium. In 1901, 1902 and 1903 Cameron consistently improved and then came his wonderful 1904 season. His physique in those days was magnificent. He stood 6 feet 11 1/2 inches; chest (normal) 48 inches; waist 35 inches; thigh 28 1/2 inches; neck 18 inches; biceps 17 1/2 inches.

Starting at the Highland game in the 1904 season, he proceeded to break records everywhere, and to make other giants look like pigmies. At the Patrick Police Sports in July of that year he created three world's records, putting the 20 lb. ball 41 feet 1 1/2 inches, the 22 lb. hammer 98 feet 8 inches and the 28 lb. weight 52 feet 10 3/4 inches. In this throw James Morrison, the nearest competitor, only reached 55 1/2 feet. Prior to this at Strathallan, in August of the same year, Cameron won all five heavy events from a representative field. In 1906 he repeated his performance at Strathallan and also won all the heavy weight events at Patrick Police Sports.

Cameron was also a fine cable tosser, and the heavier the stick the more did his superiority over his rivals become evident. He never bothered much about learning the details of wrestling or he might have done anything on the mat. The great Georges Hackenschmidt himself admitted that he would very probably have met his match in Cameron had the latter gone in for a proper course of training in the technique of the mat.

By 1908 Cameron had fourteen world's professional records to his credit, as follows: 16 lb. hammer,

122 ft. 10 1/4 in.; 22 lb. hammer, 100 ft. 9 1/4 in.; 16 lb. ball 47 ft. 8 in.; 18 lb. ball 44 ft. 4 1/2 in.; 20 lb. ball 41 ft. 1 1/2 in.; 21 lb. ball 40 ft. 4 1/2 in.; 22 lb. ball 40 ft. 1 1/2 in.; 24 lb. ball 36 ft. 6 in.; 25 lb. ball 34 ft. 1 1/2 in.; 26 lb. ball 28 ft. 5 1/2 in.; 28 lb. ball 26 ft. 1 1/2 in.; 56 lb. ball 20 ft. 2 in.; 56 lb. weight 34 ft. 1 1/2 in.; 28 lb. weight 66 ft. 0 1/2 in.

At the close of the 1904 season Cameron went to New Zealand in company with G. H. Johnson. The two athletes had a very successful tour and at the Caledonian meetings received a great welcome.

For a man weighing 17 stone, and with such a marvellous wealth of natural muscle, Cameron possessed surprising agility. He could stand high leap of 4 ft. 8 inches and at the standing broad jump he could clear 10 feet. In private practice he has covered 19 1/2 feet in the long jump, and could finish the hundred yards inside 12 seconds.

Many tempting offers have been made to Cameron to adopt a life of professional athletics in an absolute sense, but "Sandy" could never be enticed. Hackenschmidt, and later the manager of the troupe presenting Padonby, both pointed out to him the way to a fortune. Tom Cannon and his rival, the late Antonio Porrie, would have given much to secure his signature for a world wrestling tour; and Mr. Benjamin, manager of the famous Sikh troupe of which Gama was chief, thought that the Scottish athlete would beat him in a world racial wrestling tournament. But Sandy's love for athletics ended in the field sports and the wrestling prospectors were unsuccessful. When he had surpassed the efforts of all the champions, he appeared to be perfectly satisfied, and returned to the glens around Spear Bridge to busy himself with the affairs of a flock-master.

Mr. Cameron referred to in the above sketch has many relatives in this province. He is a cousin of the late Donald Cameron, of the District of Queens in the Provincial Legislature, and chairman of the Committee of the whole House considering the P. E. Island Railway Bill. He is also a cousin of Malcolm Matheson, Track Master of the Eastern Division, P. E. I. Railway, and of Mr. D. M. McDonald, of Springfield. For the news clipping quoted The Guardian is indebted to Mr. Donald Matheson, of Regina, also cousin of the athlete, and an official of that city.

All these steers are grade Herefords and Shortorns and are an excellent demonstration of what can be accomplished by the crossing of these two wonderful beef breeds. Mr. Etter also disposed of three pure bred Hereford Steers to Mr. Frank Sanderson of North River. Mr. Sanderson has purchased the Champion Hereford Bull from Mr. Ed. Saunders of this city so that no doubt Mr. Sanderson will have something pretty good for display at future exhibitions.

SHIPMENTS OF GEES.—It is about a month too early for the annual migration of wild geese southward, but nevertheless large flocks of geese are passing through this city on their way to the United States, says the St. John Telegraph. They are of the domestic variety, although many of them are mongrels, that is to say, partly wild and partly of the domestic strain. Every year United States buyers go to Prince Edward Island and buy thousands of live geese from the farmers for the Boston and New York markets. The birds are shipped alive and attended across the border. Already this year half a dozen carloads have passed through this city.
