Canadian Building Contracts Decrease

TORONTO, Jan. 7.—The value of construction contracts in Canada in 1921, according to MacLean's records, was \$240,000,000, as compared with \$275,000,000 in 1920, and \$299,000,000 in 1919.

Reared German Steamer Founder in North Sea

CHRISTIANIA, Jan. 7.—A message from Hangesund today says it is feared the German steamer Signal of Kiel with a crew of 25 men, foundered in the North Sea on Dec. 17. The Signal was an iron screw steamer of 1,276 tons.

The Reply of Doctors To An Alcoholic Questionnaire

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—A majority of physicians in nineteen states, replying to an alcoholic questionnaire sent out by the Journal of the American Medical Association, asserts that they did not regard beer and wine as necessary therapeutic agents in the practice of medicine.

Daughter-in-Law of The Former Kaiser

BERLIN, Jan. 7.—Princess of Russia, widow of the former German emperor's youngest son, who committed suicide in 1918, is bringing action against William Hosenfeld for a maintenance allowance on the ground that her marriage contract, concluded in accordance with the laws of the Hohenzollerns, entitles her to the means of subsistence.

May Cancel Ice Breaker Contract

OTTAWA, Jan. 7.—The fulfillment of the Liberal chief's warning to Hon. Arthur Meighen before election that contracts issued there would be carefully scanned before being accepted, it is expected that the ice-breaker contract awarded to the Canadian Packers Co. of Montreal, for \$1,300,000 will be cancelled.

London Times Man Returns

Halifax Police To Guard Digby

T. Wainwright to request Halifax to send experienced police officers to help handle the situation.

Charlottetown Second In Artillery Competition

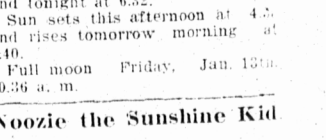
