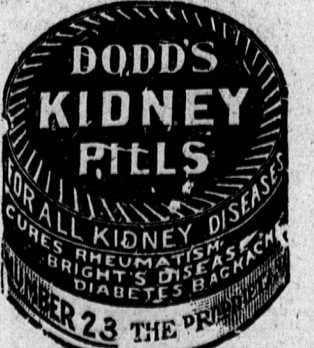

GLASGOW LORD PROVOST ON VISIT TO MONTREAL

MONTREAL, Aug. 6.—The Lord Provost in Canada—"My conscience, it's no possible." Yet strange as it may seem, the Lord Provost of Glasgow has allowed himself to be lured from the "comforts" of the Sautmarket to cross the Atlantic and this morning he was actually tramping the streets of Montreal, having arrived last night on the "Tunisian." He left to-day for Ottawa.

But what is a Lord Provost anyway? To those ignorant enough to ask such a question, it may be stated that a Provost is the man whom the Scot admires the most. People who do not know any better compare a Provost with a Mayor, but he is much more than that. He owes his position not to any party success at the polls, but to his own shrewd business qualities, displayed during a long apprenticeship in the Municipal Council. He does not hold office for one year, like a mere English Mayor, but is appointed for three years by his fellow councillors, Nay, more, as the Scottish proverb says, "Aince a Provost, aye a Provost." He is never plain Mr. again, and to his dying day he is addressed with the soothing word of "Provost." "Hoo are ye this mornin' Provost." "It's a fine mornin' saying," these are the expressions with which he is greeted though he may long have passed the Provost's chair. A Provost, therefore, is a man of great dignity, but a Lord Provost it need hardly be said, is doubly more, especially the Lord Provost of a city like Glasgow.

HIS IMPRESSIONS

One wonders what the Lord Provost will say about Montreal when he gets home. Fancy a man visiting our city who presides over a town council which runs street cars without overcrowding for its citizens, whose water system is never in danger of running short, and is so pure that spring water companies are unknown in Glasgow, which supplies its gas to its citizens at a half dollar and less a thousand cubic feet, and whose City Hall is above all suspicion of graft.

The Lord Provost of Glasgow who is visiting Canada at this time, is Mr. D. M. Stevenson, one of the greatest authorities living on Municipal enterprise. He is a rarity among Lord Provosts. In that he is a bachelor, in fact, one cannot say off-hand whether Glasgow ever had a bachelor Lord Provost before, though readers of Sir Walter Scott's "Rob Roy," will remember that in his portrayal of that famous Glasgow town councillor, "Baillie Nicol Jarvie," no "Mistress Jarvie" is mentioned. Another interesting fact about Lord Provost Stevenson is that he was the first Lord Provost to take office while his father was living. Unfortunately to the regret of his colleagues who had made this unique event the occasion of a presentation to the elder Mr. Stevenson, the latter died a few months ago.

Like a celebrated Scottish Provost in fiction, "Jeems Kaye of the Strathbungo," Lord Provost Stevenson, is in the coal trade, in which he built up one of the largest coal exporting businesses in Scotland. He is sixty-two years of age, and has been a town councillor in Glasgow since 1892. As indicated, he warmly believes in municipal ownership. In his younger days he advocated the municipalizing of the tramways, which is probably Glasgow's greatest success in this direction. He was also the means of securing a system of municipal telephones for Glasgow, to enable the citizens to fight the monopoly held by the telephone company. Temperance reformers will be interested to learn that he is a strong temperance advocate, and has been associated with policies for the reduction of licenses in Glasgow. A man of strong opinions he is not afraid to express them, and recently when Lord Roberts visited Glasgow to advocate entertainment, the Lord Provost when entertaining the veteran Field Marshal, who is an honorary freeman of Glasgow, made it plain, in a tactful way, of course, that he did not agree with the policy advocated by "Bohs."

Lord Provost Stevenson's visit to Canada at this time is of a private nature, but in view of his presence in our midst, it may be well worth while pointing out that there is no city on the other side which has done more for the Dominion than Glasgow, London gives us money, it is true, but see that she gets it back again at a good rate of interest. Glasgow has given us brains and brains with which to develop our country, and never seeks, or rather never gets it back again, for Scots only return to Scotland for a holiday.

GREAT MEN.

It would take up too much space to record the names of all the Glasgow born men and women who have done something to make Canada famous. Two men only one names in the political sphere, Sir J. A. Macdonald, was a Glasgow man, and proud of the fact, while in Montreal, one of the most enduring names is that of James McGill, founder of our Univer-

city and he, too, was a Glasgow man. Stroll round our streets, especially in the busy warehouse districts and you will see the names of great Glasgow firms. Down in the harbor you find great lines of steamships trading between our city and the Scottish port, and if the other vessels do not hail from Glasgow, you find that in about seven eighths of ten they were built there or in the suburbs along the banks of the Clyde.

Seeing that Montreal, that Canada owes so much to Glasgow let us hope that the Lord Provost's itinerary in the Dominion will be unlike such a pleasant nature that unlike "Baillie Nicol Jarvie" of old, he will not sigh for the "comforts" of the Sautmarket.
