CROMER'S LIFE WORK IN EGYPT

"Even Our Superb Administration of India is Hardly a Brighter Jewel in Our Imperial Crown"

LONDON, April 2.—In two long, carefully-written volumes Lord Cromer tells the story of "Modern Egypt." He begins in 1876, when he was born on the banks of the Nile, pointed Commissioner of the Public Dept. He finishes with the record of the Anglo-French agreement of 1904. During most of the intervening years Lord Cromer was actively concerned with Egyptian affairs, and during those years order was established from chaos, and a new country was born on the banks of the Nile. The bare recital of events is a sufficient testimony to Lord Cromer's own great career, and the story more than justifies the quotation printed at the head of this article. "Though it was inevitable that in writing of modern Egypt Lord Cromer should be at times autobiographical, he is always modest, and in the following pathetic passage he cites the causes of his success:—"I owe the success, in so far as public matters are concerned, to the co-operation of the body of high-minded British officials, who have persistently held up to all with whom they have been brought in contact a standard of probity here-

ITALIAN MADE A RICH HAUL

Was Boarding The Steamer Teutonic Witch \$45,000 When Arrested

CHEMBOURG, April 2.—Detectives today arrested Alexandro Gioletto an Italian railroad official while he was in the act of boarding the White Star steamer Teutonic, which sailed today for New York. Gioletto, is charged with the robbery of \$39,200 by breaking in a New England Oil Company station at Chitasso, a town of Switzerland on the Italian frontier. Gold to the amount of about \$30,800 was found in the man's valises, and \$14,800 in bank notes were discovered wrapped about his body. He is accompanied by a young Italian woman with whom it is alleged he was eloping to the United States, having abandoned his family in poverty in Switzerland.

BRITISH TARS BRITISH SHIPS

Sailors On British Merch Ships Must Hereafter Speak English

LONDON, April 2.—The British Government issued a notice recently that foreign seamen should not be engaged on British ships in European waters, unless they have enough knowledge of English to understand orders given in that language. It is stated that it is no uncommon thing to find a ship's crew composed of eight or nine nationalities, with absolutely no language in common, and perhaps a boatwain who only understands English an "interpreter." The return relating to British seamen employed in the British mercantile marine shows 30 English and 1,154 per 10,000, while Scotland supplies 56 and Wales 44 per 10,000. The proportion of Lascars and foreigners increases, while the British decrease. In the last fifteen years, 1891-1906, there was an increase of 17,103 Lascars. (East India sailors) and 11,022 foreigners, and of British only 510.
