Military Funeral

The funeral of the late Private 1-c Robert Arthur MacDonald, took place at Montague, Sept. 5, 1946, with Military Honors.

Arthur, as he was better known, lost his life while serving with the American army of occupation in Vienna, Austria. The army truck in which he was riding over-turned, while negotiating a curve.

Military ceremonies were held in Vienna, and after members of his company formed in line on either side of the casket, Captain Batterman Army Chaplain performed the last rites of his church.

Arthur was a son of Dan and Marjorie (Ings) MacDonald and was born in Mt. Dennis, Mich., U.S.A., but spent most of his life with his parents at Montague.

He enlisted at Fort Devins in the Infantry, going overseas and serving with that regiment up to the time of his tragic death.

His remains, escorted by Sgt. Master John W. Bunker, arrived in Montague on Tuesday, Sept. 3rd and funeral service was held in the Montague United Church where an exceptionally large number of residents of Montague and vicinity gathered to pay their last respects to a popular boy and soldier of 19 years.

The service was conducted by the pastor Rev. A. S. Adams. The choir sang "The Armies of the Lord" and "Safe in the Arms of Jesus." The Brooklyn Trio, Messrs. Bruce and Munro, sang with deep feeling and expression "The Beautiful Land."

Two brothers, David and Malcolm and two sisters, Marjorie and Florence are left to mourn the loss of a kind and loving brother.

The many floral tributes, cards and letters bore evidence of the multitude of friends and pals in Montague and United States and the unit in which he served.

The sympathy of the entire community goes out to the parents and family in the loss of a loving, kind and thoughtful son. Sympathy is also extended to Mrs. MacDonald's mother, Mrs. Levi R. Ings of Call, Iowa, who has remained with her daughter through her tragic experience.

At the conclusion of the service at the grave, the American flag which draped the casket from Vienna to Montague, was presented to the family by the president of the Montague Branch, Canadian Legion, Mr. M. C. Reynolds. (Patrol please copy)
