**YOUNG JAPSARE LEARNING ENGLISH**

OTTAWA, Oct. 25.—Alexander MacLean, Canadian Commercial Agent in Japan reports that the new import tariff of that country went into force on the 1st instant. The rush to land goods before the new duties took effect were the occasion of some fast runs across the Pacific shortening the time from the American continent by two days.

This year's rice crop in Japan is much more abundant than that of last autumn. The silk crop, too, is good; but the condition of the market has resulted in stagnation all along the line. There is rapid talk about the development of a rapid rail route to Europe via Vladivostok and the Trans-Siberian Railway.

Mr. MacLean alludes to the fact that although well-nigh every language of the world is heard in the cosmopolitan parts of Japan, there are but two languages in common—Japanese and English—and it is the English tongue that the young Japanese are most ardently desirous of learning.

**RICHARD CROKER ON TAMMANY HALL**

DUBLIN, Oct. 27.—In the course of an interview published this evening in the "Telegraph," Mr. Richard Croker, referring to Tammany Hall and its alleged bad reputation, said: "It is a case of giving a dog a bad name. If anyone connected with the organization, however insignificant his position, does anything dishonorable, Tammany is blamed."

The reformers never did anything for New York," Mr. Croker continued. "The great bridges, the elevated railway, the public buildings, and everything are the work of Tammany. If there was corruption, why did not the District Attorney prosecute somebody. The Hall has succeeded entirely on its merits. It is the most democratic institution in the world. If anything is wrong with it, then something is wrong with the people themselves. It stands not only for the poor man, but also for the foreigner, newly landed on American shores. It believes as against the Republican party, that the foreigners should receive the benefits of the American constitution as soon as possible. It stands all round for equal rights."
