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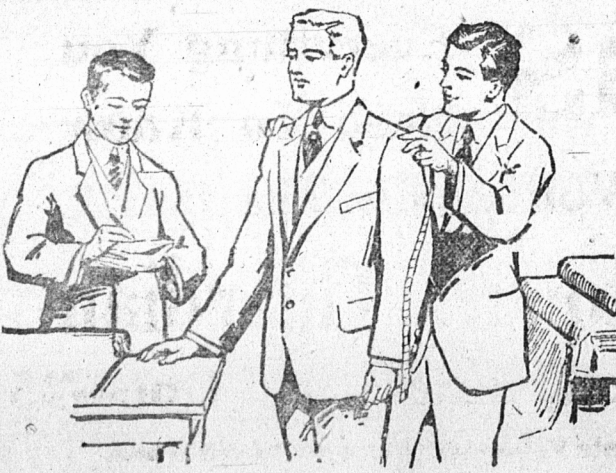

PROMISING DEVICE.—Mr. A. J. McCabe, Manager of the carpet department at Provise Bros. Ltd., has applied for letters patent on an invention in carpet departments. The invention consists of a truck device intended to facilitate the handling measuring and cutting, also the displaying of specimens of carpets or like. Owing to the weight of linoleums and other materials the difficulty of carrying them has always been a source of annoyance and loss of time both to the salesman and to the customer. This device obviates all this. By the invention any roll may be conveniently fitted upon the rollers and the material may then be unrolled in such a manner as to exhibit a portion of it to the best advantage and to dispose of the same on the floor of the cutting space. The invention will no doubt be in great demand in all carpet warehouses. Mr. McCabe is to be congratulated on the ingenuity of this device and he will no doubt reap a rich reward for it as its uses become better known in the mercantile world.

REV. DR. C. M. GRANT, FORMERLY OF HALIFAX

LONDON, May 5.—The death is announced of Rev. Dr. C. M. Grant, formerly of the Parish Church of Dundee, Scotland. He was a native of Nova Scotia and ministered at Halifax for some years.

OTTAWA, May 5.—Announcement of the method proposed by the Government to grant aid to the Canadian Northern and the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Companies, which have been applying for assistance, to meet their pressing obligations, is contained in the supplementary estimates for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1917, which were presented to Parliament today. Parliament will be asked to vote \$15,000,000 to be lent to the Canadian Northern Railway and \$8,000,000 to be lent to the Grand Trunk Pacific Company. The terms upon which the loans are to be made, the security to be taken by the Government and the objects to which the money is to be devoted, in both cases the disposition of the loan is to be subject to the direction of the Governor-in-Council. The most important of the conditions of the country is to be repayable on demand and is to bear interest at 6 percent per annum, payable half yearly. In each case the loan is to be secured by a mortgage upon the undertakings of the company or companies concerned. The loan to the Canadian Northern Railway Company is to be used for expenditure made or to meet indebtedness incurred in paying interest upon securities of the companies included in the Canadian Northern Railway system having priority over the guarantee by the Government under the legislation of 1914 and instalments of principal of equipment securities and upon construction. The whole loan is to be secured by a mortgage upon the undertaking of the Canadian Northern Railway system, and is to be secured by an additional mortgage upon the undertaking of the subsidiary corporations. The mortgages are to contain terms and conditions approved by the Governor-in-Council. The loan to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company is to meet indebtedness incurred in paying interest upon securities of the company, and to purchase rolling stock. It is to be secured by a mortgage upon the undertaking of the company on terms approved by the Government. Two other important items referring directly to the loans to the two companies and to the general railway situation in the country are contained in the supplementary estimates. The first is a vote of \$15,000,000 to provide for a continuous audit of the revenues and expenditures of the Canadian Northern and Grand Trunk Pacific systems, a second appropriation of \$150,000 to provide for enquiry and report upon the railway situation of Canada.

RECRUITING IN ENGLAND

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, May 2. The recruiting problem in England will be dealt with by the British Parliament in a bill introduced calling for general and immediate compulsory enlistment. Although since the commencement of the war naval and military enlistments have exceeded five million, Premier Asquith told the House the existing machinery was not sufficient to get more men and that it was the purpose of the Government to ask Legislation that would compel so called slackers to answer their country's call.

With the situation in Ireland normal, military authorities are busy running down the few Sinn Feiner who failed to surrender. All the main bodies of rebels laid down their arms but until the situation is entirely under control there will be no lessening of the activities of the military. Martial law will be maintained. A German attack against Belgians north of Dixmude is the only infantry engagement reported at any point along the western front. Artillery bombardments were severe north-east of Verdun, North of Dixmude the German heavy artillery fire, German aircraft bombarded several Russian positions on the Gulf of Riga. A Russian air squadron delivered an attack against the German naval base at Windau, Courland.

Vienna reports heavy fighting between Austrians and Italians in the Adamiolo sector, that the Austrian Italian fight is still going on and that Italian attacks against various Austrian positions have been put down with heavy losses. The Russians are keeping up the pressure of the Turks by Diarbekr region, Asia Minor. A number of Turkish infantry have been killed. Constantinople reports driving ashore in the Black Sea by Turkish submarines of three Russian steamers and the sinking of three food laden sailing ships. Three steamers, one of them neutral, have been sunk but whether by mine or torpedoes is not stated.

prison, and that S. MacDiarmid and E. Ceannad had not been accounted for. MacDiarmid, who is a cripple and in feeble health, and Ceannad and James Connolly, three of the original signers are apparently still alive. Plunkett was a member of the Catholic branch of the famous Irish family of that name. William Pearce, among those who were shot Thursday, was a brother of Patrick H. Pearce, an artist and sculptor and was once a tutor in the Irish boys' school, of which his brother was headmaster. Edward Daly and Michael O'Hanrahan, also among the rebels killed yesterday, have not played prominent roles in the revolutionary movement so far as appears.
