

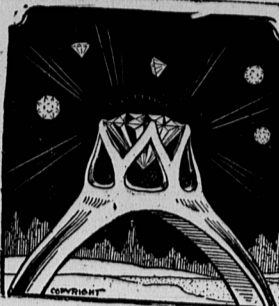

The first meeting of St. Dunstan's Mock Parliament since the adjournment for the Christmas holidays was held on Wednesday night. The debate on the draft address was resumed and Hon. C. J. McDonald, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, was the first speaker. This gentleman dealt principally with the Hudson Bay Railway project, and showed how necessary this railway was for the tapping of the great west and for the quicker transportation of grain across the Atlantic. The next speaker was Mr. Brennan, opposition member for Cape Breton. He dealt with the reciprocity question, and showed that this treaty would materially decrease the revenue of Canada, whilst making up for this great loss. Mr. Brennan was followed by Hon. P. Normand, Minister of Labor. The honorable minister made a brief speech, which was confined to the urgent necessity of universal suffrage in Canada. W. V. McDonald, opposition member for Calgary, then spoke. This gentleman made his maiden speech, and he promises to develop into a very strong debater. Mr. Donald brought the Government to task for side-tracking such important measures as the Navy and the Transcontinental Railway, and introducing such secondary matters in importance as universal suffrage and abolition of the Senate. The Minister of Public Works, J. A. McDonald, next occupied the floor and devoted his speech chiefly in reply to the previous speaker. He enlarged on the Government's policy for the construction of the Georgian Bay Canal, and he also stated that the Government intended to introduce stringent laws to prevent illegal practices at elections. During Minister McDonald's speech, feeling ran high, the honorable minister going so far as to accuse the leader of the Opposition of bribing at the recent election. Leader McNeill indignantly denied the accusation, and demanded proof, which the honorable minister promised to produce ere the session was over. Mr. Walker, opposition member for West Elgin, had the floor when the House adjourned.
