## ABDUL'S HAMID'S AGENT NADIR PASHA HANGED

### His Name a Terror, One of Three Who Brought on the Events of April 13. Awful Results of Persecution and Massacre. Indian Moslems Stirred by Sultan's Fall.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 29.—(Special)—Nadir Pasha, second eunuch under Abdul Hamid, was hanged at dawn on Bala bridge, the great thoroughfare that connects Stamboul with Calata.

Nadir came to the imperial palace as a slave and grew up in that hot-house of intrigue. Abdul Hamid relied entirely upon Nadir, who is regarded as the chief conspirator in the events of thirteenth April.

Adana, April 29.—(Special)—The conditions in the country surrounding Adana, as a result of the fanatic attacks by Moslems on the Christian population are terrible. Dead bodies are lying out on the fields and numberless Armenian farm-houses have been burned.

## THE DEATH OF FRANCIS DONOVAN

There departed this life at St. John's Road on April 21st, Francis Donovan, at the early age of 32 years. He leaves to mourn a father and mother; also four brothers, Patrick, John and William in the United States, and Michael, at home, and one sister, Mrs. Thomas O'Brien, of Bangor. He bore his brief illness with Christian patience to the Divine will. He was an honest and upright young man, and his memory will long be cherished in the community where he resided.

## RADCLIFFE WANTS TOO MUCH TO HANG ITALIANS

ST. JOHN, April 28.—Unless he decides to abandon his present intention this week Sheriff James Tibbits, of Andover, will perform the double execution on May 4, when Tony Arosia and Leon Seppell, confessed murderers of Edward Green, will be hanged in Andover. As he believes the fee for hangingman Radcliffe's services is exorbitant, as double the amount of a single execution is asked, Sheriff Tibbits intends to act as executioner himself.

## NARROW ESCAPE FROM DISASTER

### Express Train Ran Into Open Switch. Was Saved by Emergency Brake.

MONTREAL, April 29.—(Special)—The Rutland express from New York ran into an open switch at Iversville and a big disaster was narrowly averted.

The engineer threw on the emergency brakes and stopped the train just as it crashed into the freight. A brakeman had a leg broken. The cleaner and a tramp were also hurt.

## BIG REVIVAL HAS OPENED IN MONTON

MONTON, N. B., April 28.—Rev. Dr. Elliott, of Boston, Tuesday night opened in the First Baptist church one of the greatest revival campaigns ever held in Monton. There was a very large attendance and music was furnished by a large choir. The revival is being extensively advertised, banners being stretched across Main street and literature being widely circulated.

## BODY OF DEAD MAN IS IDENTIFIED

ST. JOHN, April 29.—The body of a man was found among some bushes about five miles from this city yesterday. It was identified as that of "Didney" Morris, a Scotchman or Englishman, twenty-four years of age. He arrived here from the Old Country last November and boarded here till January. Since then nothing is known of his movements. The condition of the body showed that the man had been dead a long time.

## THE DEATH OF EMMET NOOMAN

Sincere sympathy will go out to Joseph and Mrs. Noonan of Albany who have just received a wire announcing the death of their son Emmet in California. No particulars are yet known. Mrs. Noonan received a letter, a last long letter—from her son about two weeks ago. He was then in good health and expected to leave shortly for Seattle. The next news was that of his death. Another son, George, of Winnipeg has wired his parents to the effect that he was leaving for California and would bring the remains to P. E. Island for interment. The deceased went to the Golden State about four years ago. His departure at that time was a loss to the province as he belonged to that class of young men whom it is always regrettable to lose. Quiet, unassuming and courteous in his manner he was yet capable and ambitious and had acquired those habits which make for sterling manhood. He was about 28 years of age. This is the first break in a family of ten one of whom is Miss Lizzie Noonan of the Prince of Wales College staff, Charlottetown. To the grief-stricken parents, brothers, sisters and friends the Guardian extends deepest sympathy.

## THUNDER LIGHTNING RAIN, SNOW AND FIRE

### Chicago and the Middle West Swept by Furious Storm. A Million Dollar Blaze in Railway Elevator. New York Has Had Cold Weather. Snowstorm Yesterday.

CHICAGO, April 29.—(Special)—One fireman was killed, another missing, and eight seriously injured in a fire which destroyed the elevator of the Illinois Central Railroad today. The conflagration was discovered in the height of a violent electric storm and completely consumed the elevator and contents. Loss \$1,000,000. The blaze, fanned by a gale, spread to the Illinois Central docks, train sheds and freight cars and was with great difficulty checked from a general spread over the lake front.

The sky for miles was illuminated, and huge burning embers spread over the city, driven by the high winds. Violent storm accompanied by thunder, lightning and rain struck this city shortly after midnight. Reports of damage from near by towns are coming in. The storm was prevalent throughout the middle west and worse proportion of wires and property damage is expected. Kansas and Iowa have experienced windstorms approaching a tornado in violence. Telegraph and telephone wires have been blown down for miles and the lightning and rain have caused much damage. A tornado has wrecked a portion of

Douglas, killing one person and injuring a dozen. Snow heavy enough to cause a blockade is reported from Oshkosh, and is general throughout the North west. NEW YORK, April 29.—(Special)—After nearly a month of extremely cold and unseasonable weather, New York experienced a late April snowstorm today. Snow began falling about six and at eight o'clock snow is falling as thick and fast as in February. Since the beginning of April only one warm day has been experienced and all through the month the temperature has remained in the vicinity of the freezing point at some time of the day.

## FLORENCE KINRADE IS FREE FOR THE PRESENT

TORONTO, April 28.—The warrant issued on Friday night by Coroner Anderson, of Hamilton, for the arrest of Florence Kinrade came before Chancellor Boyd and Justice Magee and Latchford in the divisional court this morning, when George Lynch Staunton, acting for Miss Kinrade, asked that the warrant be quashed. Argument was lengthy on both sides. J. R. Cartwright, appearing for the attorney-general. In the end the judges reserved judgment. It may be days or weeks before a decision is rendered, as the evidence already tak-

en must be submitted to the judges. Meanwhile the inquest will be declared. In his argument, Mr. Staunton made six points:— That no coroner has power to issue a warrant for the apprehension of any witness; that no coroner has power to issue a warrant outside the jurisdiction of his own court; that the coroner's court is a statutory one, and that the statute gives no power to the coroner to arrest for contempt of court; that the inquest being an investigation at which the liberty of witnesses are in jeopardy, no witness can be asked incriminating questions, any more than a witness could before a magistrate; that Miss Kinrade, having told all she knew concerning the death of her sister, cannot be called again, because such procedure is a vexatious abuse of the process of the court; that no one, outside the crown attorney, has authority to examine a witness at a coroner's inquest. Mr. Staunton was particularly severe on the treatment Miss Kinrade received in the witness box.

## BAILEY'S SPEECH TOOK UP TWO DAYS

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 28.—At the last half of his two days' speech, Senator Bailey devoted nearly three hours in the Senate yesterday to a discussion of the legal aspects of his income tax amendment to the tariff. Bill citing numerous cases and authorities to maintain the view that such a law would be constitutional. He was interrupted frequently by senators, who at times offered objections to his position or suggested authorities to sustain him. The Senate was fully represented in the audience that accorded Mr. Bailey a hearing, and the galleries were crowded.

## LIQUOR TRAFFIC IN MONTREAL

MONTREAL, April 29.—Strong evidence was secured at the Montreal Royal Commission showing the system which prevailed under which Montreal, for years had earned the position of being the widest open city in Eastern Canada. Many hotel-keepers and others were called, and their evidence was that a regular system existed by which they kept open on Sunday and at all hours, and were occasionally summoned down upon payment of costs with the collusion of Chairman Proulx, of the Police Committee, and the Chief of Police, Campeau.

## AN INTRIGUE OF ABDUL HAMID

VIENNA, April 29.—The Committee of Union intend publishing full particulars of the massacres in Asia Minor, for the purpose of proving that they were instigated by Abdul Hamid in order to discredit the Young Turk rule and provoke a foreign intervention. Kiamil Pasha, the former Grand Vizier, has been arrested.

## CIVIC ELECTIONS HELD AT HALIFAX

HALIFAN, April 29.—Joseph Chisholm was yesterday elected mayor of the city, defeating Ald. Hubley by 498 majority. All the Aldermen were re-elected.

## THE BRITISH ESTIMATES

LONDON, April 29.—Hon. Lloyd George, Chancellor of the Exchequer, issued explanatory memorandum yesterday on the revenue and expenditure for the year. He estimates that the revenue in 1909-10 will be \$741,950,000 and the expenditure \$820,760,000, showing deficit of \$78,10,000. The Budget will be presented in the house of Commons. The increased expenditure is due mainly to the Old Age Pensions and the increased appropriations for the Navy. Dealing with the past years finances, the Chancellor says that nearly all branches trade and industry suffered a serious depression, foreign trade returns showing a diminution amounting nearly 570,000,000. It is impossible he says to prophesy any immediate rapid recovery; but there are indications that foreign trade is beginning to improve. The revenue of 1908 fell short of the budget estimate by 7,510,000. The National Debt of Great Britain now amounts to \$3,770,606,545.
