(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 7.—Announcement of Canada's representatives at the coming assembly of the League of Nations was made this afternoon by Premier W. L. Mackenzie King at the conclusion of a cabinet council. They are: Hon. Raoul Dandurand, who also represents Canada on the Council of the League, Hon. W. D. Euler, Minister of National Revenue, and Hon. J. C. Elliott, Minister of Public Works. Alternate delegates are Sir George Foster, President of the League of Nations Society in Canada, Malcolm McLean, member of parliament for Halifax, Miss Agnes McPhail, member of parliament for South Grey and Hon. Phillip Roy, Canadian minister at Paris. It is desirable that the women of Canada should be represented in the assembly, Mr. King said, and the choice of Miss McPhail seemed most appropriate.

Commission On Education Sits In Prince County

The Royal Commission on Education was held Tuesday at Tignish. Evidence was given from representative business and professional men and farmers not only from Tignish but from the surrounding rural districts. The witnesses were Joseph Bernard, John Donahoe, Dr. Johnson, John Hackett, Elmer Pineau, Wilfred Rhoderick and others. They discussed teachers' salaries, text books, consolidation of schools and other phases of the educational programme.

It was the opinion of all that the teachers' salaries are at present in general too small and should be increased. Various opinions were expressed on the soundness of basing the salaries from the Government wholly on the class of license. In answer to questions by the Chairman, it was the general opinion of all witnesses that experience, efficiency, and character of work should be considered as well, so that the teacher of long experience and of unusual capacity should be more adequately rewarded. Several witnesses suggested direct taxation as a means of making an increase possible. One witness particularly deplored an alleged lack of interest in education in many communities.

In answer to further questions, agreement was expressed with the principal of consolidation. Some believed, however, that it should not be quickly forced on the districts but should be attempted if at all feasible, and where the districts could be made to realize its value. No objection was made to the Chairman's suggestion of larger school units, which might take in for administrative purposes several districts, the size of each unit to be based on geographical position and population of children. It was agreed by some that the creation of some units would help the smaller districts and lead to increased efficiency and the elimination of small schools would follow, thereby eliminating considerable waste.

It was suggested that for many years back, the Department of Education had not been giving country districts the lead that might be expected to evidence a deeper interest in local educational problems and that the visit once or twice a year by inspectors was not sufficient to stimulate enough interest. There was considerable discussion over the increased price of readers of 1927 and 1928 more especially over the price of the French readers which is very much higher than that of English. The age at which children should enter school was placed by some at six or seven instead of five which was believed to be too young.

The position of teachers today was considered to be more difficult than it was years ago because of modern recreation which interferes with the pupils' home work. There was some criticism and also praise regarding school fairs. The course of studies in the schools was considered to be too burdensome and it was felt that too many subjects were attempted.

Teacher training at Prince of Wales College was said to be inadequate. There was some criticism of inspectors not visiting the schools as frequently as called for by the Education Act also for the general character of their reports as published which were said to contain very little specific information on the condition of various schools.

Among the other subjects discussed was pensions which were generally approved if a workable system could be devised, the large number of failures in the Prince of Wales College Abstrucation Examinations, the age at which licenses should be granted, etc., etc.

The session at Tignish was very satisfactory and the Commission expressed pleasure at receiving so much valuable information. Meetings of the Commission were held yesterday at Alberton and O'Leary. The Commission sits today at Egmont Bay.

of Theology. The Rector and Council of Laval, he said, had awarded this as a special mark of esteem and as an appreciation of the splendid work of St. Dunstan's since its foundation, especially under the guidance of Dr. Murphy. The award was greeted with loud applause and a succession of yells.

Bishop Kelley His Lordship Bishop Kelley, of Oklahoma, one of St. Dunstan's most distinguished sons, was the next speaker. After a succession of witty anecdotes, which kept the audience in an uproar for a considerable time, he declared that St. Dunstan's should be a little larger than it is. He spoke of university conditions in his diocese at Tulsa and Oklahoma City and declared emphatically that Prince Edward Island should support its University more loyally. In every university city in the United States, everybody contributes to its endowment, St. Dunstan's, he declared, should be taken to heart more warmly and generously. "The trouble is," he said, humorously, "that you Prince Edward Islanders are too darn stingy. If cash is the difficulty let's start something and do something." The University, he continued, should aim for \$100,000 endowment. Bishop Kelley himself offered \$1,000. He declared that he was struck with the opportunity offered in agriculture in this province. There are many who do not know how to farm properly. There are many farms running out. Such effort would be an immense donation to Prince Edward Island.

"If we are going to have a university, we must do the solid work of a real university," continued Bishop Kelley. After urging more remuneration for the teachers, he declared that there is lots of room in Prince Edward Island for the maintenance of professional courses. Bishop Kelley declared that a university is at present being erected in his diocese at a cost of \$200,000, but promises that if the Alumni would take the situation seriously, he would do everything possible to aid them.

Sir Charles Dalton then briefly commented on the financial situation of the College, making suggestions by which it might be improved. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, the next speaker, in opening, paid a high tribute to the work of St. Dunstan's. Firstly there is the religious aspect and the inculcation into the students of "those deep and solid religious principles that are tied up with any profession and without which a man has little chance of permanent success."

Referring to the words of Bishop Kelley, Dr. MacMillan declared, "When history is written the name of Bishop Kelley will stand out as one of the most distinguished diplomats the Catholic Church has produced." What is wanted is money. The University is adequately equipped in but one respect—its teaching staff. Much, continued Dr. MacMillan, can be accomplished out of this great reunion. He declared it his emphatic belief that \$100,000 can be raised for the University in the province. Mr. George E. Hughes, who attended St. Dunstan's 62 years ago, was the last speaker. Whatever success he had had in life, he ascribed to the University.

Evidence was given by the men of the party in the motor boat who had spent the half-holiday on a visit to Tormentine to the effect that at about 10.30 on the night of July 31st, when some distance outside the lighthouse, at the entrance to Summerside Harbor, the boat swerved and Eddie Gaudet, who was sitting on the left hand side of the engine cover, slid overboard. The engine was immediately stopped, a search kept up for half an hour and every possible effort made to locate the missing man and rescue him, but without avail.

After hearing the evidence, the Coroner held that there was no evidence of foul play and that death was due to accidental drowning and an insufficient knowledge of boating. The funeral was held at 2.30 in the afternoon from the undertaking parlors to St. Paul's Church and Cemetery, Rev. J. J. MacDonald officiating. The large attendance testified to the respect in which the deceased was held throughout the community and deep sympathy of all for the bereaved widow, four male children and other relatives left to mourn.
