Picking Your Life Job

The various branches of engineering recognized through the five national societies are civil, mechanical, mining, electrical and chemical engineers, who follow the practice of engineering, according to the name applied to the societies. Engineers in my opinion, are born, not made. One must have a practical mind to start with. It

must be moulded by discipline and tempered by experience. If you are to gain success, you should have a liking for mechanics, because considerable of your work will involve contrivances of this nature and you likewise have to be good in mathematics. In setting forth such requirements as these I am covering the whole field of engineering. They apply with equal force to the different branches.
To you, who are interested in engineering, as a career, I would say this: You must get good marks in mathematics and have a liking for mechanics and physics while you are still in preparatory school, and in college, you should have an aptitude for scientific studies.

In the past it was not absolutely necessary to have a college degree to get a job as an engineer. Now, however, it is, because the applicant is in competition with about sixty thousand engineers now in practice in this country. From this fact, you will see the need for proficiency in the studies I have named.
Four years of training in college is enough scholastic work to qualify you to earn your living as an engineer. You will, however, need several years of hard, practical experience.
You will do well to spend what time you can spare from technical subjects, in studying economics, contract law and finance. Know-

ledge of these matters is most helpful to an engineer as he progresses.
Do not neglect to obtain as much outdoor exercise as you can. If you are interested in athletics, engage in the sport for which you are best equipped. You will need a strong body and a well-trained mind to stand up under the demands of your profession.
Generally speaking, about \$150 a month will be the initial pay in the different branches of the profession. After that, your salary will be based on your own proven ability and practical experience.
There will always be a need for good engineers and a real opportunity awaiting them, but there are

too many mediocre ones being turned out of the colleges and technical schools every year.
MEDICAL GRADUATES STILL FLOCK TO U. S.
MONTREAL, Que., June 22.—(By The Canadian Press)—The lure the United States still has for Canada's recent medical graduates and the anxiety American hospitals show to get them is indicated by a canvas of the recent graduating class from McGill University. Eighty-one of those who were students at McGill and residents of Montreal before the term ended were canvassed. Of these, almost half have decided to go the United

States. Many of these, educated by Canada at great expense, will likely remain in the United States, it was said.
Of the total, 15 will go to hospitals in New York state, while other states who will get McGill's doctors are as follows: New Jersey, 5; Louisiana, 1; New Hampshire, 1; Connecticut, 1; California, 2; Iowa, 2; Massachusetts, 3; Pennsylvania, 2 and Rhode Island, 3.
Those remaining in Canada number 36 and of those three go to Saint John, N. B., one to Toronto, one to Walkerville, one to Edmonton and two to Vancouver.
