PERSONALS Miss MacDougall of Summerside, is quite seriously ill in the Prince County Hospital. Her many friends trust that she will soon recover.—S.

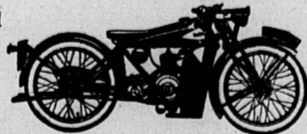
