Emigration Turns Toward Australia

ST. JOHN, N. B., March 8.—Sir Augustus M. Nanton, of Winnipeg was one of the passengers to disembark from the Moncaim on her arrival here today in Liverpool. Sir Augustus was enthusiastic in his praise of the Moncaim, the latest acquisition to the C. E. O. S. fleet, which he characterized as ideal in its appointments, and provides the travellers with the ease and comfort so much desired in an ocean voyage. "Business conditions in England are becoming more settled," said Sir Augustus. "Despite the restlessness in political circles and the general unrest in labor organizations, industrial leaders are attacking their problems with such a courageous spirit with swing of optimism, that the professed calamity howler is unarmed and put to flight. It is the spirit that wins and England's industries will very soon be back to pre-war levels. "There appears to be a general feeling," he said, "for a greater migration to the overseas dominions. There is but very little being done by Canada to secure the emigrant so much needed to help out the war-torn areas. As a result of Canadian indifference, many who desire to locate in the Dominions are going to Australia. These emigrants are of the best type, the representatives of the Roman Catholic Church entirely upon their own responsibility, or by the submission of a stated case by the province, asking for an interpretation of the law.
