Nova Scotia Town Boasts Of Prosperity

(Special To The Guardian) SHELBURNE, N. S., Jan. 25.—This town located on the south shore of Nova Scotia along the lines of the Canadian National Railways boasts of eighty-one percent of last year's taxes collected and less than three hundred dollars spent for poor relief. Not a bad showing in these times.

Shelburne has an interesting history, it started out under the name of "New Jerusalem" in 1764 when an Alexander McNutt, leader of a sect thought he would anticipate the aged Gabriel and establish the new order of things at once. He, however, failed to comply with the requirements of the grant with regard to colonization and his scheme fell through. Evidently the old Jerusalem looked good to most of the people of the day.

Shelburne took another chance at achieving notoriety and this time it started when the watchman went through the streets of Philadelphia around midnight during the American revolution shooting "past twelve o'clock and a fine morning, Cornwallis is taken." In the city of New York at the time were some hundreds of loyal citizens to the British Crown who then and there commenced to look around for a place to start anew. Glowing reports were received from Port Roseway afterwards changed to Shelburne, and on May 4, 1783, some five thousand Loyalists arrived in the harbour. Two months later five thousand additional Loyalists landed from ships. For a time everything was rosy and there was much gaiety. The town which was named Shelburne after the then Secretary of State in the mother country springing up almost overnight. But the money soon gave out and there was not enough citizen population to support the town population with the result that many of the Loyalists left to seek homes elsewhere, leaving behind many splendid buildings which stand to this day and a wealth of historical lore, the town has a hand operated fire engine, presented by George the third in 1787. Henry Ford wanted to buy it for his museum but the town would not sell. Many of the Loyalists brought their negro servants and there is still a colored population descended from these.

Starkes' Trial At Newfoundland

JOHN'S, Nfld., Jan. 25.—He had known Roland Starkes for 15 years and was convinced the member of the Legislature for Green Bay had "done everything possible under the circumstances," said John Albert Bartlett, giving evidence today at Starkes' trial on 72 charges connected with the administration of unemployment relief in his district.

The member for Green Bay, elected as one of the two Squires supporters last summer, is charged with forging, uttering forged documents and receiving money under false pretences.

Pneumonia Serum Known In Montreal

MONTREAL, Jan. 25.—Serums have been in use for some times in Montreal in the treatment of pneumonia with varying results according to the type of pneumonia, McGill public health doctors pointed out today in commenting upon the discovery of a "new treatment" for this malady by Dr. Edwin E. Zeigler of the United States Administration, Washington, D. C.

According to the despatch from Washington, Dr. Zeigler's method of treatment, so far used only with rabbits, involves the use of pneumocholin to develop immunity. Pneumocholin is made by dissolving the germs which cause pneumonia in a solution prepared from bile. McGill medical research workers pointed out that it has been known for a long time that pneumococci, the germs that accompany pneumonia, dissolved in bile. Whether immunity could be gained from one or more types of pneumonia by the use of serum made in such a way was still a doubtful point, they said after reading of Dr. Zeigler's discovery.
