WHY NEGLECT THE PEAR?

Pears are a neglected fruit, and undeservedly, for there is no more refreshing fruit when newly ripened, and it lends itself to a variety of uses for the table when cooked. Later pears often solve a problem to a housewife in devising a variety of preparations for the table or winter use. Winter pears are fine baked and served with cream. They may be baked and canned in quantity in the winter, and will then be ready to serve for breakfast during the winter, either by warming them in the oven or cold.

Pear conserve is one of the most attractive forms of using the pear, which is now plentiful.

Peas and quarter a half peck of pears, removing the cores. Place them in a kettle with two pounds of sugar and let them stand for twelve hours. Drain off the liquor and bring it to a boil for about ten or twelve minutes. Add the pears and half pound of seeded raisins and the same quantity of broken English walnut meats. Add the juice of two lemons and one orange and cook slowly until it thickens. The nut meats should not be added until the last quarter of an hour of cooking.

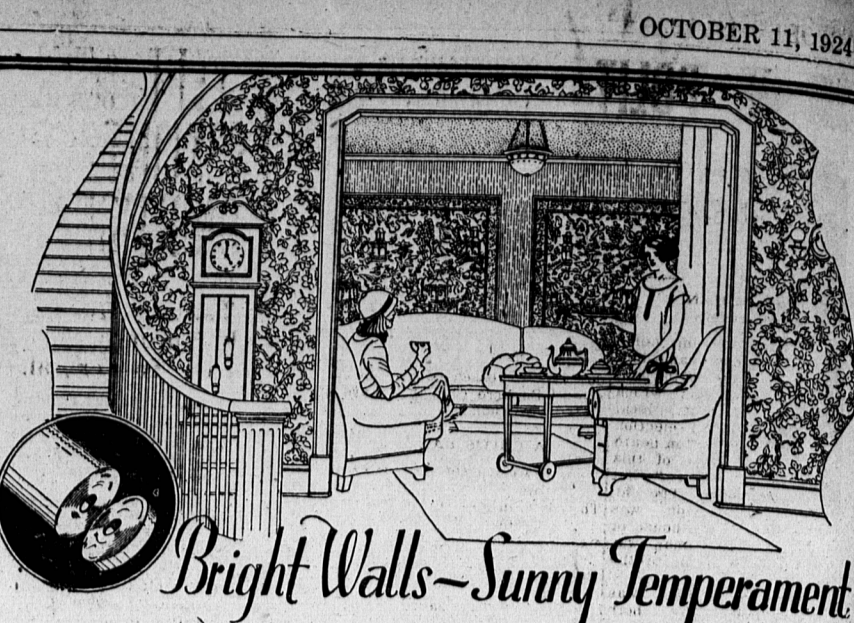

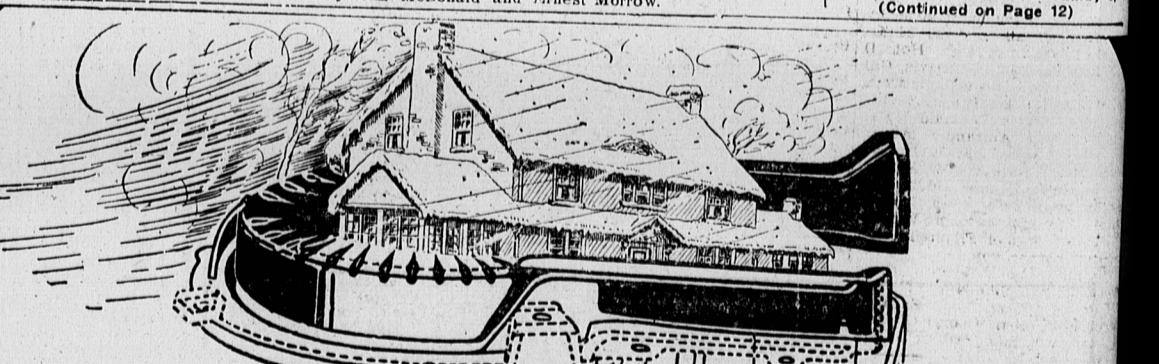
