MEMORIAM

MRS. W. HONNEYWELL SPENCE

Mrs. W. Honneywell Spence of Hunter River, died after a brief illness at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John McInnis, North Winsloe, on the evening of Saturday, June 28th at the early age of 42 years. The late Mrs. Spence (Edna McInnis) was a most attractive and capable young woman, had been married to take a deep interest in the work of the church and community as well as the home, and was a very useful worker of the S. S. choir and other organizations of the church. She was married in November 1928 to Mr. W. Honneywell Spence and began her married life in Hunter River. About two months ago she returned to her early home and it was hoped that rest and the bright days of summer would restore her to health, but in spite of all that human skill and tender nursing and care could do she gradually weakened till the last week, when she rapidly sank and passed away early in the evening of Saturday. Her early death is very greatly deplored by her many friends with whom she was extremely popular. On the same day of her funeral a brother of Mrs. McInnis, the late Mr. Isaac Laird, who died suddenly in Boston was buried; and earlier in the month, Mr. McInnis received word of the death of his only brother, Charles McInnis of Maine. The funeral services at the house and grave on Monday, June 30th, were conducted by Rev. G. A. Grant, of Winsloe and Rev. A. E. Chapman of Hunter River. The hymns sung were "unto the hills around" one of her favorites, "Is my name written there" and "Asleep in Jesus." Beautiful floral tributes were received from the members of the family and other relatives. The S. S. of North Winsloe United Church of which the late Mrs. Spence was a member and the Institutes of Cy-ster Bed Bridge and Greenvale. Mr.

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N. D. McLean of Charlottetown conducted the services and the pall bearers consisted of Messrs Irving Laird, Earle McInnis and Claude Craswell of North Winsloe, and Robert Smith, Russell Bernard and Peter Marten of Hunter River. Interment was made at North Winsloe. Besides her husband and her parents the late Mrs. Spence is survived by a brother Gordon at home, and also one sister Maud, Mrs. J. Winfield Folland of Niagara Falls, New York, who was with her sister, in her last illness. To the family so heavily afflicted the hearts of a host of friends go out in affectionate sympathy.
