REV. J. A. WINFIELD, rector of St. Mark's church, Kensington whose resignation was announced some days ago, has accepted a call to the rectorship of Trinity church, Episcopal, St. Stephen's, N. B. in succession to Rev. F. Robertson, who removed to New Glasgow, N. S., last week.

A MONTREAL despatch announces the graduation from the Royal Victoria College, Montreal of Miss Annie Rodd, who was presented with her diploma by Lord Strathcona. Miss Rodd is a daughter of Wallace Rodd, Brackley Point and was formerly with Westlake Bros., photographers, late of this city.

DESTRUCTIVE MONTREAL FIRES

MONTREAL, April 3.—(Special)—Two fires Saturday night did damage to the extent of one hundred thousand dollars. The first was in Place Youville where the building is occupied by several produce firms. It was gutted. As the stocks were light this time of year the loss was smaller than it might have been.

The second fire was on Craig St. and burned out the Abbey Effervescent Salt Co. and small firms principally Truss Manufactures. Loss of the Abbey Co. is placed at forty thousand.

OWING to the snow blockade there was no special train to Georgetown last night.

DR. S. R. JENKINS recently lost his handsome Shetland pony. The animal was found dead in the stable in the morning.

VICTORIA Division, S. O. T. still continues to have encouraging meetings each week. There is never a night without initiations or proposals for membership and the interest continues to grow. An enjoyable meeting was held last night.

The Minto and the Stanley were both in the Straits all day yesterday. The only work received was the following from Dodd Dwyer: The Minto is fast in the ice half way between Cape Bear and Pictou Island. The ice is very heavy and there is a thick snow storm. The Stanley is fast in the ice two miles east of Pictou Light.

THE St. John Telegraph, referring to the rumor that David Russell's visit to St. John has to do with the proposed sale of The Telegraph and Times, says the Telegraph and Times are not for sale and there is no sort of foundation for the rumor. Mr. Russell, the Telegraph says, would not accept \$250,000 for his St. John newspapers today, if it were offered. The paper further says that "Hon. H. R. Emmerson's friends" have not money enough to interest the owner of the Telegraph and Times.

AULD Bros has removed their office and warehouses to the Riley Building, formerly the Welsh and Owen block at the corner of Queen and King streets. They will occupy two out of the three sections of this large building and will thus have ample accommodation for their increasing business. The building has been recently repainted and renovated and is most commodious. There are large outer and inner offices and two front entrances besides two in the rear. The floor space on the four floors is ample for the large business conducted and affords increased facilities for trade by this enterprising firm.

They have secured for Prince Edward Island the agencies of seven of the most up-to-date factories in Canada, manufacturing upholstered goods of all kinds, brass and iron beds, wire and top mattresses, chairs, general bedroom and kitchen furniture and floor coverings. The securing of these agencies enables this firm to sell goods to the retail householder at remarkably low prices. Mr. McParlane is at present going over the Island in the interests of his firm. This is a new industry in the house furnishing line and one which will enable buyers to secure goods and save the charges of several middle men, and at the same time assist home industries.

THE storm of Sunday and yesterday brought another blockade in the railway line, the cuttings which had not been widened filling up again with the drift snow.

Cond. Kelly's train leaving Charlottetown yesterday morning for Summerside laid up last night about one and a half miles east of North Wiltshire where the train in charge of Cond. Tanton coming to the city and travelling on time had to remain all day. The trains from Souris and Georgetown came through to Charlottetown in the forenoon some hours late but met heavy snow last night. Cond. Stanley for Souris laid up all night at Mount Stewart and Cond. Hibbett had to wait at the same place till after eleven at night. The delay was caused by the detention of Cond. Gillis with the special from Georgetown at Egan's Cutting just outside of Mount Stewart where he was stalled for some hours. Cond. Gillis reached Charlottetown at 12:40 this morning and Conductor Hibbett, Georgetown at one o'clock. The Cape Traverse train was not run yesterday.
