Mr. Simon Pinesau of North Rustico, who was stormstaid in the city on Thursday, returned on Friday afternoon in the trap to Hunter's River.

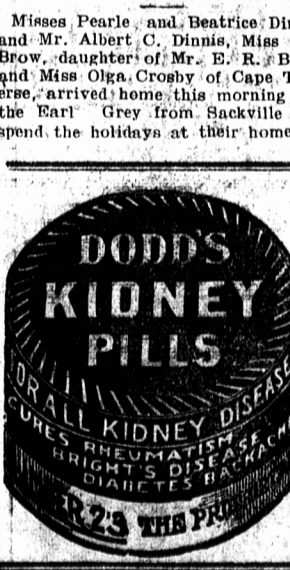
