Ray Robinson Wins Unanimous Decision Over Kid Gavilan

PHILADELPHIA, July 11.—(AP)—Sugar Ray Robinson tonight won a unanimous decision over Cuba's Kid Gavilan in a 15-round fight for the world welterweight title.

A crowd of about 35,000 saw the fight in Municipal Stadium. Robinson weighed 147 pounds, Gavilan 144½.

Referee Charley Daggart and Judge Harry Lasky voted nine rounds to six for Robinson. Judge Frank Knabersborough scored it 12 to 3. The Associated Press scorecard had the title-holder ahead 11-4. There were no knockdowns but Robinson was cut slightly over both eyes while Gavilan bled from the nose.

Robinson had a tough struggle to cut down his poundage to the 147-pound weight limit, and made it without an ounce to spare. Then he called on his experience and boxing skill to outpoint the chumbalancing Cuban by a wide margin.

For the first seven rounds against a younger and finely-conditioned opponent, Sugar Ray knew he had been in a fight. Then he stepped out to show he was the boss and he did it expertly.

Defending his title for the fourth time and the first time in nearly 13 months, Robinson found himself up against a tough, determined but relatively inexperienced opponent.

Gavilan, a professional since 1945, lost to Robinson in a non-title contest last September. Many fight observers said that Gavilan had improved tremendously since that time but apparently his first experience with Sugar

Ray hadn't given him a winning combination.

Never Stopped Trying
Gavilan never stopped trying but after the seventh round, tonight that was all he could do. Sugar Ray jabbed and backed away at the same time, giving a superb defensive boxing display and picking off the Cuban's best punches with his gloves or catching them on his elbows.

Toward the end, Robinson even put on a couple of show-off stunts for the crowd in Municipal Stadium. Ray would let the aggressive Gavilan catch up to him in a corner then would start and swap punches until he had fought his way out. Once he just stood with his back against the ropes and rolled his head away from punches as the Kid did his best to land one.

The bout, getting the benefit of near-perfect weather conditions, drew a bigger crowd than had been expected. Officials of the Philadelphia Arena Corporation, which promoted the affair, estimated gross receipts at more than \$100,000.

The champion's share of this was 40 per cent of the net, while Gavilan took 18 1-2 per cent.

In his dressing room Ray said after the fight that he is ready to give up the welterweight title if he can get a shot at the middleweight crown.

"I was in the best condition of my life," he added.

Gavilan, he said, stung him once or twice but never hurt him and his only worry was about Gavilan's wild swings.

The rather bewildered Cuban insisted he thought he had won a close fight, and plaintively asked how the officials could give the champion so many rounds.

Canada's Davis Cup Team Named

MONTREAL, July 11.—(CP)—Two veterans and a brilliant young newcomer were named today to join little Henri Rochon of Montreal on Canada's 1949 Davis Cup team that will meet Australia here next week. The squad immediately started to limer up on Montreal's grand courts.

The Canadian Lawn Tennis Association's selection committee awarded the three remaining berths on the team to Brendan Macken of Montreal and Walter Stohberg of Lorne Main of Vancouver.

Announcement of the nomination of Macken, Stohberg and Main followed trial matches and the annual east-west series at Quebec last week. The C.L.T.A.'s east-west trophy was captured by the east, 4-1.

Rochon, 25, and Macken, 26, will be making their fourth appearance in the North American zone Davis Cup tie play. Stohberg, 26, was on last year's team which bowed to Mexico 1-3.

Main, youngest player ever named to a Canadian cup team, long has been regarded as Davis Cup material. He was 19 Saturday, and his nomination to the squad comes in his first year as a singles player.

Rochon, a crafty singles player, has been in top form all season. He swept through to the singles titles of Ontario and Quebec with the loss of only one set. He also paired with George Robinson of Montreal to annex the doubles championships of the Ontario and Quebec tournaments.

American League Team 5-7 Favorites To Win All-Star Baseball Game

BROOKLYN, July 11.—With Joltin Joe Dimaggio a starter in centre field and lefty Mel Parnell of Boston doing the pitching, the American League is a 5-to-7 favorite to whip the National League in tomorrow's all-star baseball game at Ebbets Field.

Parnell, stylish ace of Joe McCarthy's oft-maligned staff, will draw either Warren Spahn, Boston Braves southpaw, or right-handed George (Red) Munger of the St. Louis Cardinals, as his starting foe at 1:30 p.m. EDT (2:30 p.m. ADT). No pitcher, however, can go more than three innings unless it's an overtime game.

A crowd of 34,000, lured by the "big names" and drama of the annual prestige battle between the two majors, is expected to jam Ebbets Field, host to the all-star game for the first time.

Trailing 11-4 in the long series, the National League probably regard the July "dream game" as a nightmare that usually ends the season's play.

Lou Boudreau, American League manager because his Cleveland Indians won the pennant last fall, first picked Joe Dimaggio to the squad and then named him to start in place of the injured Tommy Henrich, another Yankee. To make room for Joe, brother Don of Boston moved over to right field.
