## 409th R.C.A.F. Casualty List

**OTTAWA**, Oct. 30 — (CP) — The Royal Canadian Air Force in its 409th casualty list of the war today reported three men killed on active service overseas, four missing after overseas air operations, 1 killed on active service in Canada, and three missing after flying operations in Canada.
