CHANGE OF LEADERS A SIGN OF GERMAN WEAKNESS

LONDON, Sept. 7.—The morning newspapers devote many columns to a discussion of the retirement of General von Falkenhayn and the appointment of Field-Marshal von Hindenburg as chief of the General Staff, under such headlines as "A Crisis in Berlin" and "Welcome to the Wooden Man".

All the newspapers profess to see in the sudden change of leaders, a sign of Germany's weakness. Falkenhayn is generally paid the tribute of being the great strategist of a hopeless cause, while the opinion is expressed that von Hindenburg is merely a popular idol, who is unlikely to prove even a temporary success as a generalissimo.

The Times says: "In her deadly peril Germany is unlikely to have chosen the new chief merely to placate public feeling. We shall do well to take von Hindenburg seriously, and recognize that, though conditions are against him, he is no weakling."

"The glimpses we have had of him suggest a man with big and simple ideas, which often make for success in war."

The Times' military correspondent expresses some immediate alterations of strategic ideas in the German conduct of the war, adding: "All this summer von Hindenburg has been eating his heart out on the Russian front, while the troops for whom he clamored have been frittered away at Verdun. His interests and predilections are believed to lie in the east. He belongs to the strategic school, which would have struck in the east. The position points to the probable shortening of the front in France and Flanders, and he is today the only man in Germany who could order the ruthless shortening of the western front without the collapse of public faith."

MCKINNON—MCDONALD ABOUT A DRAW

HALIFAX, September 2.—The fifteen round boxing exhibition between Bill McDonald, of Glace Bay, and H. A. McKinnon of P. E. Island resulted in a draw. McKinnon was the winner by a wide, wide margin. The men entered the ring within one minute of each other and the bout started at 9:20 sharp.

The bout was an exhibition throughout and the McDonalds undoubtedly fought, clearly and cleverly, he was out-generalled and out-guessed from the opening round to the finish. McDonald is a fighter, and as much is a good one but the work of the man from across the Strait showed that he is both of which elements of the story are thoroughly human. "Rage" is another feature that deserves special commendation in this unusual offering. The settings are so complete in every little detail, that audiences will be under the impression they are witnessing a real life drama occurring in their own homes, or in the homes of close friends. A glance at the cast is sufficient comment on the acting throughout the entire story. Mary Pickford enacts a portrayal that for artistry and naturalness, it would be hard to surpass. AUSTRIAN BOMBS DID LITTLE DAMAGE

ROME, Sept. 5.—An Austrian aeroplane squadron dropped bombs on Venice Monday night without doing any damage, says an official statement issued here today. 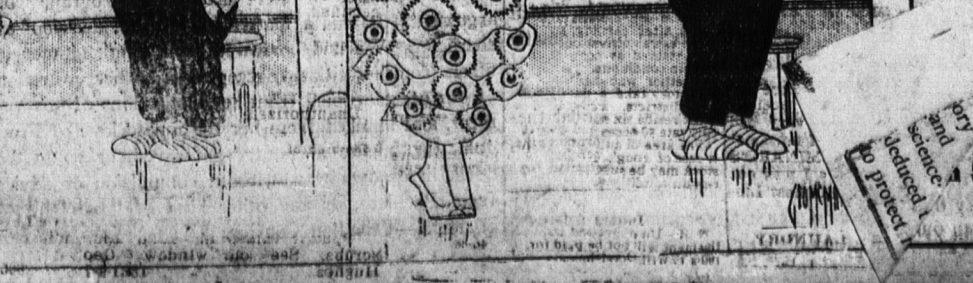
