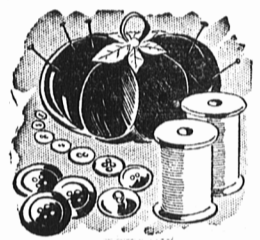

DONALD ALEXANDER MacINTOSH

On July second, there passed peacefully to his rest one of the prominent residents of Springton in his sixty ninth year, Donald Alexander Macintosh after a lingering illness. He was a very active life operator a saw mill and farm. In his earlier days he sailed the broad Pacific on the Flagship Empress of Japan a crack liner of the C. P. R. Pacific fleet. These boats sailed between Vancouver, British Columbia and the Orient.

He also spent some years in the amber woods of British Columbia and served among the craggy cliffs and mountains as a prospector. Later he returned home and established a mill on his own farm there many thousands feet of good lumber was cut. Falling health necessitated the sale of the mill about four years ago.

Since that time he fought bravely to regain his health and at times he was able to work but the last few months saw a steady decline in strength until his summons came.

He was an active worker in the Maritime Council where he served as an actor on the session and as a member of the trustee board. Death came early Thursday morning July second and the funeral service was held on Saturday at his late residence, Rev. U. Carlyle was officiated in the presence of his minister Rev. A. O. Thompson.

He leaves to mourn their loss his beloved wife, formerly Flora Gillis, three sisters (deceased) Mrs. William Holmes, California, U. S. A.; (Euphemia) Mrs. Lore, Arizona, U. S. A.; (Margaret) Mrs. Wilson, Wright, California, U. S. A. and three brothers John Macintosh, Englewood, California, U. S. A.; Anthony Macintosh, Roderick Macintosh and one brother Angus pre-deceased him July 26th, 1914. Three daughters remain (Christine) Mrs. Roy Taylor, Somerville, U. S. A.; (Euphemia) Mrs. Alva Welsh, North Tryon, (Mamie) Mrs. Arthur Jackman, Inkerman, P. E. I. One daughter Janet predeceased him, also one son Angus Spencer who predeceased him a year and a half ago. One son Duncan Gillis at home. Also ten grand children mourn his passing.

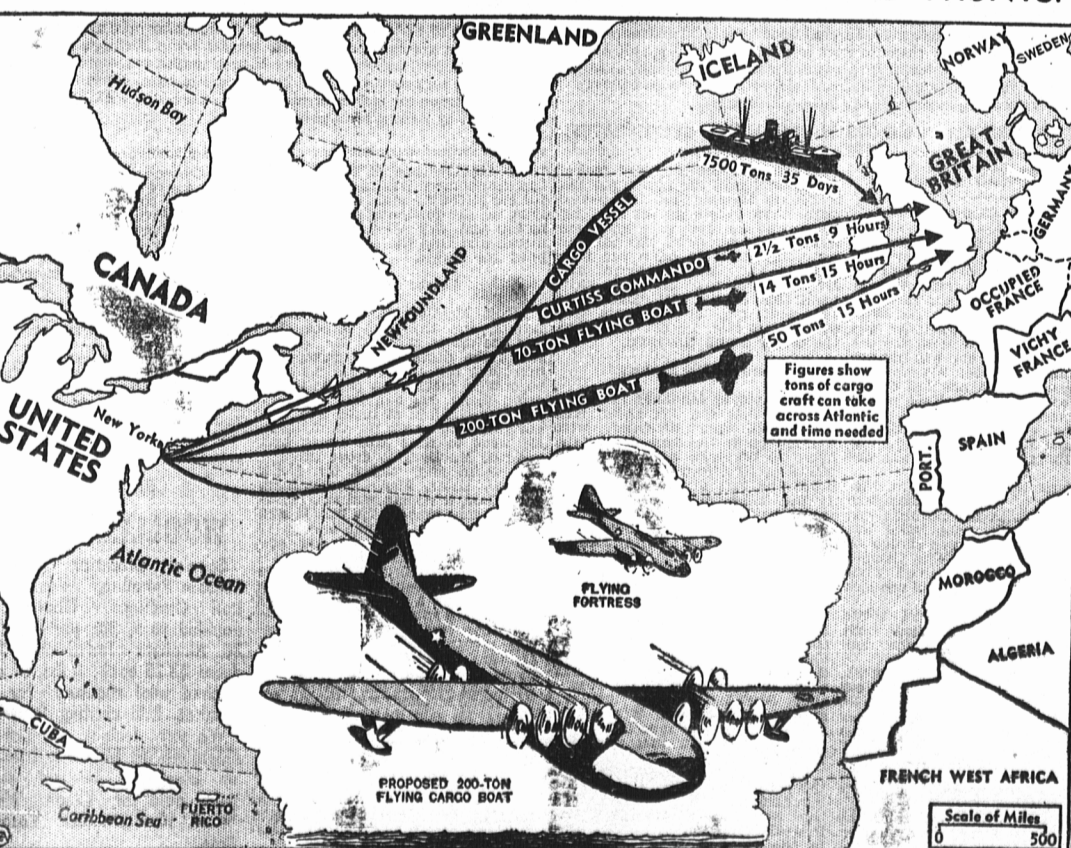
