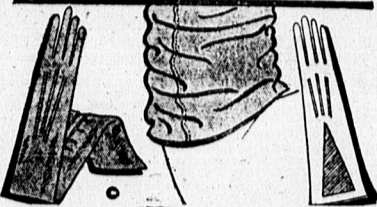

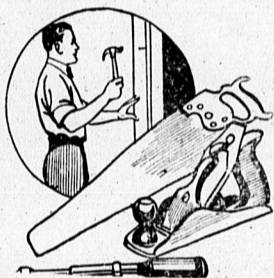

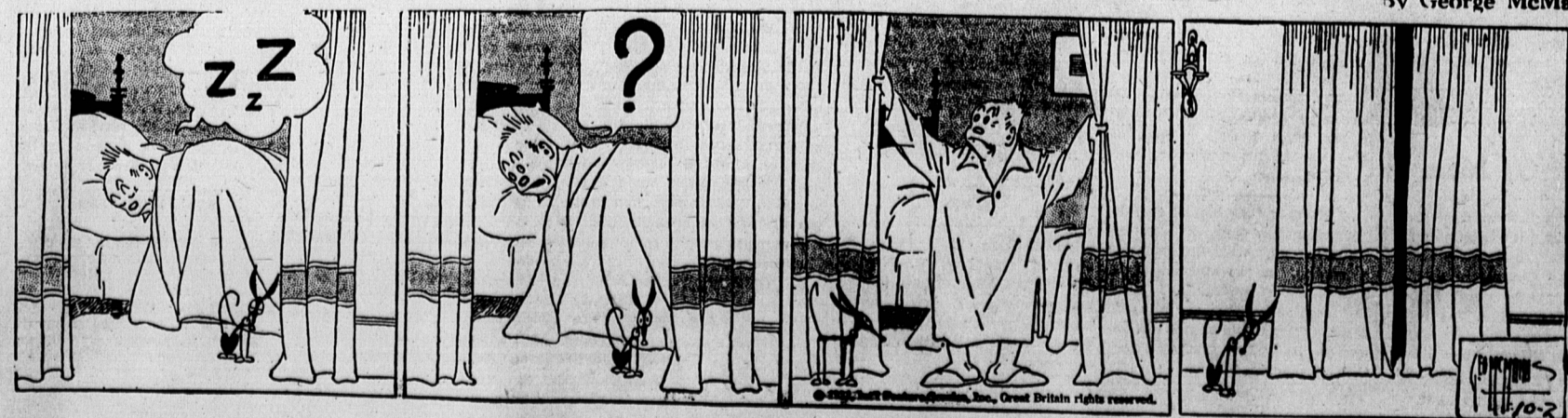

BRINGING UP FATHER



DUMPING DUTY APPLIED

OTTAWA, Ont., October 1.—(By The Canadian Press)—The Government yesterday advanced another stage in its efforts to strike a balance between Canadian and British Manufacturers when it decreed by order-in-council that the dumping duty would be applied on importations from Great Britain and thus eliminated the discount on British currency in this country. This order supplements that of Tuesday. This said that for duty purposes the value of shipments from the United Kingdom would be translated in terms of the pound sterling at par. This is to say, notwithstanding the depreciated value in Canadian currency of the English pound, duty would be collected on consignments from Great Britain as if the pound had not depreciated.

Going farther than this, the government yesterday afternoon ordered that dumping duty would apply on such importations to the extent of the difference in Canadian currency between the depreciated pound and the par value of the pound.

A high authority illustrated this in the following example:
If a shipment of goods is received in Canada valued at one hundred pounds, its invoiced value in Canadian currency would be, on the basis of yesterday's exchange, approximately \$436.000. Under yesterday's order-in-council, however, the duty on this shipment would—if the duty were ten per cent—be \$48.66, since the order set forth that the duty was to be collected on the basis of the par value of the pound, and not on its depreciated value, which would have made it \$43.50.

Under yesterday's order, not only will the duty be calculated on the pound's par value, but the difference between the par value of that shipment (\$486.66) and its depreciated invoiced value (\$435.00) will be regarded as that much less than the "fair market value for home consumption" and will be exacted additionally as dumping duty. Under the law, authority exists to impose a dumping duty up to 50 per cent of the actual invoiced value of the shipment, but this order is not interpreted to mean that more than the exchange difference is to be applied.

MRS. WELLINGTON HASLAM

The community of Springfield and surrounding country were shocked and deeply grieved to learn of the death of Mr. Wellington Haslam on Saturday, Sept. 26th, at the age of 70 years. Mr. Haslam suffered a slight shock two years ago, but seemed to regain his usual good health until a few weeks before his passing, when he developed pneumonia and other complications and gradually sank until the end. He will be greatly missed by his many friends and especially by his neighbors where he was always willing to lend a helping hand when needed. He spent all of his life at Springfield being one of the progressive farmers of that place. His loss will also be keenly felt in the home where he was a kind and loving father and leaves a vacancy which can never be filled. He leaves to mourn besides his sorrowing widow, John and Basil, and one daughter Amelia, all living at home. The sisters are Mrs. Charles Dickson, New Glasgow, Mrs. Frank Weeks, Fredericton, and two Brothers Samuel and Stephen of Calgary Alberta. The funeral which was largely attended took place on Monday Sept. 28th, a short service being conducted at his late residence and the remains were conveyed to the Church or England where the deceased was a life long member. The both services being conducted by his pastor Rev. Mr. Bridgewater assisted by Rev. Thomas Palethorpe of the Bradalbane United Church.

"Bossy" Gillis Assaulted By Board Member

NEWBURYPORT, Mass., Sept. 30.—Mayor Andrew J. "Bossy" Gillis and President Eugene Twomey of the City Council, who were scheduled to do some explaining in District Court on charges of disturbing the peace, were given a few days of grace when the cases were continued.

Judge Nathaniel M. Jones announced when the cases were called that "it would be better if some other Judge heard these cases," and continued them until Saturday.

The charges were an aftermath of a brief but exciting meeting between the Mayor and Twomey on the street after a council meeting. "Bossy" had made a two hour speech at the meeting in which he called some of the Councilors "yes-yes" men and other names

far from complimentary. He concluded by telling his hearers they could sue him if they desired and circumstances have forced the Earl of Bessborough to cancel his Nova Scotia tour for the present. The telegram read:
"Greatly regret that circumstances have arisen to lead His Excellency, Twomey, a copy to Nova Scotia, but quite understand and appreciate his decision. Please convey my respects to him and assure him Nova Scotia will be glad to welcome him at some future time."
