THE Christian Guardian published in Toronto says:—"The smallest Province in the Dominion has the honor of enacting the first prohibitory measure. The Legislature," which prorogued on Saturday, June 9th, passed a bill absolutely prohibiting the retail sale of all intoxicating liquors, except for sacramental, medicinal, scientific or mechanical purposes. The wholesale trade is also limited to that sold to druggists and physicians, and for consumption outside the Province. The Government appoints inspectors and prosecutors; vendors must take out licenses, and make semi-annual statements to the Provincial Secretary of all sales made. Illicit selling is to be punished by a fine of not less than \$100 for the first offence, and not less than six months imprisonment for the second and consequent offences, without the option of a fine. The bill goes into force on June 5, 1901, at the expiration of the half-year's licenses. Great praise is given Premier Farquharson by the temperance people of the Province."

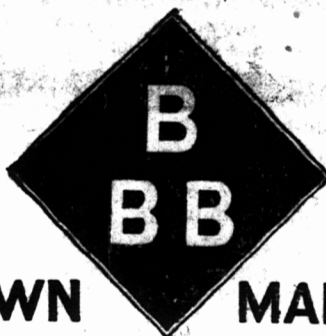
