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NAZIS SEEK TO BLOCK BRITISH MOVES

With Grand Admiral Erich Raeder at his side, Adolf Hitler met and congratulated crews of submarines which had returned from "successful expeditions."

The offensive against Britain is raising the question of how effective are the German surface vessels, and German aviators and submarine commander have been competing to prove the effectiveness of their respective weapons.

Hitler was described as intending to carry out the whole German offensive on the basis of German reports of sea successes.

It was noted here that French communications themselves reported Allied aviation increased its observation flights deep into Germany various lines of communication.

Reports reaching here said troops loaded with troops and war supplies moved all day and all night through Baden, central Germany, from the Polish front.

Most of the troops which fought actively on the Polish front were given a rest by relieving garrisons outside the Western Front war zone, which in turn were sent into the Siegfried Line fortifications.

Some units participating in the fighting on the Polish front where resistance was weak were sent directly into the Siegfried Line. Their stories of the Polish campaign were selected to raise the morale of the Germans on the Western Front although it already is high because of the speedy conquest of Poland.

CARLYLE, Sask., Sept. 28 - (CP) - Nelson Sammy, Indian of White Bear reserve near Carlyle, about 120 miles southeast of Regina, today was committed to stand trial for the murder of four persons on the reserve which will take place at the fall sittings at Arcola, Sask.

Sammy is accused of shooting to death his wife, Ruth Sammy; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Shewack; on Aug. 25 and then killing Constable W. E. Rhodeniser of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in gun duel following day.

Mrs. Sammy died at the home of a friend near Carlyle, Saskatchewan, after a long illness. Her two young children, the shooting which pre-empted the deaths of Mr. and Mrs. Shewack beside the house, were present.
