Canada's War Expenditures

LONDON, May 17.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer states that the total received from the Dominions for the repayment of loans is £27,000,000, sterling, mostly in respect of interest, and from the Allies £12,000,000, these figures being exclusive of the adjustment under which, by special arrangements, £30,000,000 sterling was set off between the imperial and Canadian governments.
