GENERALS ARE ALL ACTIVE

Lord Roberts Officially Announces the Relief Of Mafeking.

BADEN-POWELL TO BE MADE MAJOR-GENERAL

Receives Many Congratulations - Hunter and Buller Repairing Railways - Roberts Resting His Men - Hunter Occupied Ladybrand - Boer Delegates Not Officially Received at Washington - Steyn Talks - Boers Offer to Surrender on Conditions Which were not Granted.

THE OFFICIAL STATEMENT.
LONDON, May, 21.-(Special.)--The War Office confirms the report of the relief of Mafeking, secured on Thursday May, 17.

Col. Baden Powell will be made a Major General; possibly a Baronetcy or K. C. B. will be given him also.

Lord Roberts announces that Col. Mahon and Col. Plumer joined forces May 15 and relieved Mafeking two days later.

Col. Powell when he captured Eloff, Kruger's grandson took 9 other officers and 108 men, including 17 Frenchmen and many Germans.

The Boers lost killed 10, wounded 13; the British lost 6 killed 11 wounded.

CONGRATULATING BADEN POWELL.

CAPE TOWN, May, 21.-(Special.)--Every town and village is sending congratulations to General Baden Powell at Mafeking. Telegrams are arriving from all parts of the world. There will be an immense demonstration to-night.

BULLER HAS LAING'S NEK PASS.

Gen. Buller's advance is delayed while the railway is being repaired. His rapid forward movement to Newcastle was apparently unopposed, even Majuba Hill being passed by his scouts, the Boers scattering in all directions. They are all out of Natal.

When the British troops entered Newcastle and hoisted the Union Jack over the town hall the Boers had passed through, a disorganized mob.

All the stores and private houses had been looted, but the buildings are not much damaged.

HUNTER REPAIRING RAILWAYS.

LONDON, May 21.-(Special.)--Gen. Hunter is pushing up the railway with supplies for Mafeking and repairing the great stretch of road which has been so long in possession of the enemy.

WHAT OTHER GENERALS ARE DOING.

Gen Rundel has occupied Ladybrand. Lord Methuen has left Hoopstadt to cooperate with Gen. Hunter.

Lord Robert's force is still resting, but is expected to move forward in a few days.

BOERS OFFER SURRENDER CONDITIONALLY.

The Canadians under Gen. Hamilton, entered Findley on May 18.

Dewit wanted to surrender on condition that the Boers be allowed to return to their farms, but Gen. Hamilton declined these terms and the Boers retired.

STEYN'S SONG JOKE--CATTLE TAKEN.

President Steyn, when twitted about the migratory capital is reported to have said that the Transvaalers during the war of independence changed their capital nine times and yet defeated the British.

The British are confiscating the cattle of the rebels in the districts about Aliwal North. Colonel Adey's men have driven in 2,800 head.

BOER DELEGATES PRIVATELY RECEIVED.

WASHINGTON, May 21.-(Special.)--Secretary Hay this afternoon unofficially received the Boer delegates and arranged for an unofficial interview for them with President McKinley.

THE WEATHER.

WASHINGTON, May 18.-(Special.)--Fair, and cooler, light westerly winds.

Twenty may form themselves into a company for the purpose of purchasing, building, owning, managing and operating cold storage refrigerators for the purpose of preserving, buying, selling and trading in bait for fishing purposes by signing their names to a memorandum of agreement in the form provided in Schedule "A" to this Act.

2. The signatures to such memorandum of agreement shall be proven by the oath of the subscribing witness made before any Justice of the Peace who shall grant a certificate in the form provided in Schedule "B".

3. Upon the said memorandum of agreement having been filed in the office of the Provincial Secretary and the signatures thereto duly proven as aforesaid and twenty per cent of the subscribed capital having been paid up the Company shall be entitled by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the Province to a Charter constituting the said Company and such other persons as may become shareholders in the company a body corporate for the purpose of purchasing, building, owning, managing and operating cold storage refrigerators for bait and buying, selling and trading in bait fishing for purposes.

4. The capital stock of any company formed under the provisions of this Act shall not be less than five hundred dollars of which one half shall be subscribed. The Bill was reported agreed to without amendment and the Bill was ordered to be read a third time to-morrow.

Mr. Birch moved the House into committee with Mr. McKinnon in the chair on the bill to incorporate the Hall Company of Branch 281 Catholic Mutual Benefit Association. Reported agreed to and set down for third reading to-morrow. House adjourned till 10 o'clock to-morrow.

DIPHTHERIA AT REGINA.

Taken There by the Mounted Police Recruits.

REGINA, May 18.--Recruits for the N. W. Mounted Police have brought diphtheria to the police barracks here. The hospital and other portions of the buildings are used as sick wards. Most of the force is camped on the prairie away from the barracks. The barracks are quarantined.

FOOTBALL PRACTICE

Mr. D. A. McKinnon Sustains Injuries.

THE CHANGES IN TEAM

The Forward Line Average 170 lbs.--The Boys Hope For Victory.

The Abegweit - Crescent football team held their final practice last night preparatory to their game on Thursday 24th with New Glasgow football team which takes place on the football grounds of the N. G. A. A. The Abbies appear to be in excellent shape and ready to put up the fight of their career. During the latter part of the practice Mr. D. A. McKinnon while in a tackle sustained a painful injury to his knee and his place will have to be filled for the New Glasgow match. Mr. McKinnon's accident was the source of much regret last night by the members of the team. In the New Glasgow boys they will find worthy opponents of Rugby. The reports say they have the best team ever brought together; there since the formation of the Club. If this is so their team must indeed be a strong one for who does not remember the stirring battle between the Abbies and the New Glasgow team of former days. The Abbies will present almost the identical team which won the Maritime Championship last fall, there being but two changes in the personnel. Mr. F. Blake, who takes a place in the back division formerly played by McQuillan. McQuillan goes in the forwards in place of Gaudet who is not chasing the pigskin this year. Mr. Cavanagh of St. Dunstan's, will play forward in McGonnell's position. McGonnell is in the United States at present.

Altogether the team is the strongest the Abbies have ever had together. Their forward line averages 170 lbs and besides training the avoidpups they are remarkably aggressive and every man is a splendid scorer.

The quarters as last year do not need any recommendation. They played all around the Wanderers last year, that is saying enough. In the back line the Abbies have a quartette that is hard to beat. Every one is a sure tackler and kicker besides having lots of sprinting ability.

THE LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

MONDAY, MAY 21.

House met at 4.30.
Mr. Shaw asked the leader of the Government to lay on the table of the House a statement showing in detail how the item of \$43,63 as shown by the Public Auditor's report and charged to Bailiffs fees, County Courts is made up; the amount paid to each person; the names of the persons receiving the same respectively, and also the vouchers showing the payment to each such person respectively.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said the memo would be prepared at once.

Mr. Campbell asked the Commissioner of Public Works to lay on the Table of this House a statement in detail of the sum of \$1,490,98, expended on roads in Queen's County; \$287,17 in Prince County and \$338,71 in King's County; the nature of the work performed, the name of the roads on which such moneys were expended, the name of all parties to whom said money was paid and the amount paid to each person, and the name of the road districts in which said money was expended.
