Who Sell Patent Medicines Containing Alcohol In Toronto To Determine Whether They Violate The Law

TORONTO, Jan. 21.—(Special)—Test cases to determine if the druggists who sell patent medicines containing more than two and one half percent of alcohol are committing a breach of the liquor law will come up before Magistrate Denison tomorrow or Thursday on complaint of Chief License Inspector Johnston.

GREAT BRITAIN HAS HARD TASK

Mr. Haldane Says it Will Be Difficult to Maintain the the Two Power Navy Must Have a Force Of Three to One

LONDON, Jan. 20.—Following on Lord Tweedmouth's speech in which he said, that he must maintain the supremacy of the sea and that there must be no cheating, Mr. Haldane spoke of the Navy in a speech at Hanley recently.

While we had a great Navy, he said there might come a time when it would not be so easy for us as today to command the two-power standard.

We might not be able in days to come to depend wholly and absolutely upon our Navy with the completeness of today, and should the time arrive it would be upon the home defence forces that we should have to rest and our troops of our coast we must have, said Mr. Haldane.

LEMIEUX TELLS OF HIS MISSION

Had Japan's Assurance to Restrict Emigration, Says Japan Is Friendly—Asiatics Now One Fourth of Adults in B. C.

OTTAWA, Jan. 21.—(Special)—Hon. R. Lemieux made his statement of the negotiations with the Japanese Government to the Commons today. He declared that between 1900 and 1907 the Canadian Government had repeated assurance from Mr. Nossi, Japan's representative in Canada that Japan would restrict emigration to British Columbia, and showed they did restrict them so that only 200 a year came.

that Canada pass a restriction act, similar to the Naval Act and then adhere to the Treaty. Mr. Lemieux said the Japanese are too high-spirited to enter into any treaty which did not give her people full rights.

FRANCE'S WEALTH BEYOND COMPARE

PARIS, Jan. 20.—The Finance Minister, M. Caillaux, in an interview today contrasted the French financial situation with that of other countries. He called attention to the enormous assets the French Government and the communes hold against their liabilities.

Within forty years, M. Caillaux declares, "these will be increased by the cheating to the local authorities of valuable franchises, such as lighting, etc., and between 1950 and 1960 all the railroads will become the property of the nation."
