PREVENTIBLE DISEASES.

In the recent discussion among the doctors in Parliament the facts were brought out that eight thousand Canadians die from tuberculosis every year; that the disease is infectious; that it is largely both curable and preventible; that forty-nine out of every fifty afflicted are still unprovided with the means of rational cure and isolation in sanatoria, and are constantly infecting others. This is bad enough in all conscience, but behind it lies the larger fact that from this and other preventible diseases there is every year swept into the grave a total number equal to the population of one of our larger maritime cities.

Why should one half the deaths in the country be those of children under five years of age? It is much less than this in Prince Edward Island to our credit be it said. By the census of 1901 in this Province the total deaths were one thousand one hundred and eighty-seven and the deaths under five years were but two hundred and thirty-one, or one infant to four of older years. But in Quebec the proportion was sixteen thousand three hundred and seventy under five years to fourteen thousand two hundred at all other ages. And for the whole of Canada the infantile deaths were nearly one half of the total. What is this but "a slaughter of the innocents," a menace to national growth and a crying shame against our boasted civilization? The wild creatures of the forest rear their young with out a fourth part of such loss.

Smallpox, diphtheria, typhoid fever and many other diseases which sweep away their thousands from year to year are among the preventible diseases. Even where they do not kill they cause enormous suffering, loss of time and expense. It is nothing short of disgraceful that smallpox should be abroad in Canada winter after winter, and that it should be permitted to invade and spread through our own Province as it has during two years past. The much talked of white plague, bad and destructive as it is, forms but one of a number of maladies which are sending our people to untimely graves.

We are often told that population is Canada's greatest want. Sometimes it is affirmed that each individual life is worth a thousand dollars to the state. At great cost, nearly a million dollars a year, we are importing settlers from abroad, while from year to year an army of native born citizens perishes in helpless infancy, or falls by the way in maturer years from causes wholly preventible. Public ignorance is in part responsible, and the lack of sanitary precautions and of administrative care and energy are also factors in creating this appalling loss and waste of human life in our midst.

We have a letter from an Islander in British Columbia which will shortly appear, warning the young men here to stay at home and not to go west. He says that in Vancouver there are thousands walking the streets unable to find work.

FALSE SWEARING.

The crime of perjury is believed to have greatly increased in frequency in Canada and the United States within the present generation. It is a crime revolting to the sense of reverent persons, and is justly rated in the law as an offence of the most serious gravity. To swear falsely in any way is always an offence against the Supreme, but not all false swearings come within the legal definition of perjury. As defined by Sir Edward Oke, "wilful and corrupt perjury is a crime committed when a law/uloath is administered in some judicial proceeding to a person who swears wilfully, absolutely and falsely, in a matter material to the issue or point in question."

The importance of checking a crime of so much gravity is apparent, because it is a crime which strikes a deadly blow against the administration of justice. Judges and juries must decide all causes according to law and the evidence, and if the evidence be false it follows that the true course of justice is turned aside, or reversed. There is reason to believe that much false swearing is done by bribed electors who, with the bribe already in their pockets, or promised to be delivered afterward, make oath that they have neither received nor been promised anything. There is false swearing at the custom house sometimes over an entry of goods. That there is from time to time false swearing in our courts of law is only too apparent.

Hitherto there have been but few cases in which this grave crime has been brought home to the offenders, and immunity from punishment may have made them bolder. This ought not to be permitted. There is too much at stake. False swearing, should it become prevalent, would defeat the ends of justice, destroy the security of life, character and property, and in the end prove destructive of social order. It is time that the community awakened to a sense of what is threatening, and that steps should be taken to apply these severe penalties which the law prescribes for every clearly established case of false swearing in the courts.

There is a growing conviction that we ought to have the ballot in our provincial and civic elections. Summerside elects its civic government by ballot, and there is not another city in Canada of the size and importance of Charlottetown that does not have the ballot. There is not another Province in Canada outside this Island that does not elect its legislators by ballot. The new Administration led by Premier Hazzard has a fine opportunity to signalise its entry to power by taking the forward step of giving to City and Province the ballot vote. It would be a popular move. It has been already far too long delayed.

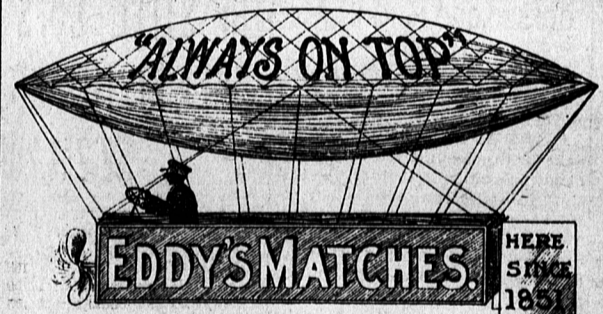
