CALLS WHITE FLOUR A CURSE OF CIVILIZATION

BOSTON, Feb. 8.—"White bread is an abomination," said Dr. John P. Sutherland, speaking last evening before the Boston District Homeopathic Medical Society of Evans Memorial on "Diet in Its Relation to Cancer." "White flour is one of the curses of our civilization. I consider it a shame to disregard that intelligent people should eat it in any form whatever." To the use of too much white flour Dr. Sutherland ascribed imperfect teeth, nervous prostration, and in many cases cancer.

He showed several exhibits, among them a case of phthis containing different grain, first in the natural form, then as ground by him in a hand mill, and finally as refined for general consumption. The last class included some of the polished rice which is considered the principal cause of herbert.

"Last year 236 cases of cancer were treated in our hospital alone," said Dr. Sutherland, referring to the Homeopathic Hospital. "Those who are studying the causes have gone in to the subjects of germs, heredity, embryology, and now, I am glad to say, of chemistry. I consider the most promising field of research."

FLIES OVER NIAGARA FALLS

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Feb. 6.—It was reported that an aeroplane passed over the falls a late hour last night, and as seen by Alex Collins, superintendent of the water works' department. A few nights ago, the guards at the Toronto Power Plant reported to Captain Scodell, that a flying machine passed overhead about midnight, it carried a red and a green light and the men said they could hear the noise caused by the exhaust of the engine. The military authorities are now making secret investigations to find out the owner of the aeroplane.

THE "BOMB" WAS A BRICK OF COAL

ST. JOHN, Feb. 8.—All kinds of wild rumors were in circulation today as a result of a supposed bomb found at the Suspension bridge last night. The police declare the "bomb" a coal briquette. About eleven o'clock Watchman Godsoe noticed a package lying near the bridge pier and found it to contain a black object, about the size of a cake of soap, with a wire projecting from it. He reported to the police and the article was taken to the central station and was lying upon one of the desks this morning. Chief Simpson said that it looked as if some one was trying to play a joke, and intimated that it would not go well for the person if he was caught.

The "bomb" was broken open and the result was to demonstrate its absolute lack of explosive quality. Compressed coal dust is the substance of which it is composed.
