ally, holding none of us can afford to go into details now. It's all together—the whole report and nothing but the report. If in working it out, we find an impossibility, then by the common sense still remaining in us we shall be able to adjust conditions.

"And I beg of every nation concerned to follow the line we have taken to take the whole report, to put it heartily into operation and to do its level best to carry out the obligations imposed by it and then to trust to the sense of justice of the world to see that right is done in the end."

"To night, taking no part in the political affairs of any country and expressing no views upon them, I feel that things are changing—changing, not by buying, not by shaking one's fists in anyone's face, but changing because of quiet sanity, of reasonable common sense that is beginning to influence the mind of all the nations of Europe."

"In his great policy of reconstruction one or two nations are not enough. France, Italy, Belgium and ourselves are not enough; Russia is not enough. My heart is with the small nations of Europe. I am a nationalist, convinced and unshaken. I respect national traditions and national characteristics. I hold that it will be a very bad day for the world if the diverse lines of humanity created by so many experiences of race, creed and clime become sand-papered into one feature. That is not my ideal; nor is it my ideal that you should run nationalism so hard that it becomes a pest to anyone trying to make peace."

sultations with members of the Cabinet, who are divided on the question. M. M. Maginot, Fabry, de Salves and Le Troquer, National bloc ministers, advised M. Poincare to hold on to power in the hope of uniting a majority in the new Chamber, while M. M. Loucheur, Vincent, Dejouvenel and Marsal opposed this method, thinking the Premier should simply hold over until the new Chamber pronounced itself.

It is understood that President Millerand takes the latter view, and general prediction tonight was Poincare will remain in power as a stop gap and will not go to Chequers Court to meet Prime Minister MacDonald on May 19, although the Quaid'Orsay still says he will. Under French usage no new Government can assume power while the Chamber is not in session, and therefore M. Poincare cannot regularly resign before Parliament meets the first week in June.
