Vatcher, F. Trainor, B. McQuillan. Of the above, three were members of the team which won the championship of the world in the tournament of 1902 viz. Ronaghan, Crehan and Hennessey, J. Wonnacott and G. Gaudin, two members of the old, will accompany the boys to Halifax. Four members of this year's team will take part in the half-mile flat race, quarter-mile and 100 yards dash, in firemen's competitions, and in some of the events of the Wanderers' Electric Light Sports at night.

ON Saturday morning at 7.30 the first farm laborers excursion will leave the city for points in Manitoba and Assinabola as far as Moose Jaw and York Town. Indications now are that there will be 250 to 300 leaving this province. Yesterday and for some days past Mr. Kennedy has been besieged by those desiring information. On Friday morning Mr. J. L. Thompson will commence the sale of tickets and those desiring the same will have to make their purchase on that day. The excursionists will be conveyed by regular trains to Montreal where a special train will be made up and it is expected that in four days the party will reach Winnipeg. The experience in the past has been that those who have taken advantage of the excursion have decided to become permanent residents. Out of the number who left the Island last year only one returned, and on Saturday next that some young man purposes returning.

SHORTLY after eight o'clock yesterday evening a runaway occurred which nearly resulted fatally to the occupants of the carriage. Councillor and Mrs. Tanton and child accompanied by Mrs. Rand and child were driving to the city from Victoria Park when Mr. W. J. Boswell's horse who was also being driven to the city took fright. Mr. Boswell was unable to hold the infuriated animal and when near the drill shed it dashed into Mr. Tanton's carriage over turning it and passing over the occupants whose escape from death was miraculous. Mrs. Rand was rendered unconscious and had to be removed to a cottage near by where medical aid was secured and after a time she was removed. Mr. and Mrs. Tanton received painful bruises but no bones were broken, one of the children also received slight injuries. Mr. Tanton's carriage was completely demolished. Mr. Boswell, who was thrown out with violence escaped with a scar on his head, his horse being captured near Pownd street.

THE funeral of the late James H. Mitchell which took place yesterday was largely attended. The procession was made up of a firing party from the Charlottetown Engineers, of which the deceased was a member, the band and members of the League of the Cross to the number of upwards of three hundred, the clergy, a wagon bearing the flowers sent by sympathizing friends, drawn by a party of Engineers, hearse, mourners, and citizens, a detachment of the Engineers Militia Officers in uniform including Lt. Col. Moore and Major Weeks. The pall-bearers were Messrs Frank Murray, Fred. Kennedy, Harry Gaudet, Frank Cotton, Charles Coyle and Vernon Gillon. At the Cathedral the ceremony was very impressive His Lordship the Bishop of Charlottetown was present in the sanctuary. Dr. Morrison was master of ceremonies. High Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Father Johnson, spiritual director of the League of the Cross, who also delivered an eloquent, forcible and appropriate funeral sermon, addressed particularly to the boys of the League.

Rev. Dr. ARTHUR SINNOTT, en route from Rome, Italy, to his parents' home, Morell, Prince Edward Island, is in Boston says the Boston Traveller of Aug. 2nd. Dr. Sinnott is the guest of his sisters Misses Mary, Etta and Alice Sinnott, 47 Appleton street, and celebrates his first mass in America at the Mission church, Roxbury, this morning, at which the young divine imparts his first blessing to his friends and acquaintances. Dr. Sinnott, who is the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. John Sinnott, of Morell, received his education on the Island and passed an examination successfully for a first-class teacher. He did not take up that profession, however, but continued his education at St. Dunstan's college, P. E. I., having decided to study for the priesthood but when a boy. At St. Dunstan's he wrote an essay on Canada and her resources, which won for him a medal and which was copied by all the principal cities in Canada and the United States. After graduating with honors the young student went to the Grand Seminary, Montreal, where he studied for four years and where he was ordained to the deaconate. In October, 1899, Dr. Sinnott went to Rome, Italy, to make his final studies for the church and in February was ordained to the priesthood. He continued his post graduate course and passed his examination for the "Doctorate in Canon Law" at the Appollinaire University about a month ago. Dr. Sinnott, according to advices from Rome, had the honor of heading the entire list of new doctors, in competition with students from all over the world. He is the youngest doctor of divinity of the Catholic church, being but 24 years of age.
