PATRIOTIC AFFAIR.—On the night of Feb. 6th, a pie social and entertainment was held at the High Bank Hall in aid of the Belgian Relief Fund. Mr. Bert Machon, being appointed chairman, in a few well chosen words explained the object of the entertainment to the large number present, notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather and the state of the roads, showing their loyalty and sympathy to the unfortunate victims of German Kultur and militarism. The program consisted of singing patriotic and comic songs, recitations and dialogues, interspersed with instrumental music. Miss G. Glover was organist and Mr. Caleb Jordan directed the musical part of the program. Special mention might be made of a song (sentimental) sung by Mr. C. Jordan and the response by Miss Glover, both being dressed in ancient costumes; a male quartette by four "negroes" and a song by Miss Marion Gilles. "When your boy comes back to you" both these last numbers being heartily encored; also two little school boys dressed in khaki and acting as sentries, while the song "Being on the old camp ground" was being sung. One number on the program was cancelled, a military drill by the pupils of White Sands School, owing to some misunderstanding. However, all gloom was dispersed when the genial auctioneer, Mr. David Glover, appeared on the scene, with his smiling countenance, and proceeded to sell the pies all glittering with tinsel and decorated most artistically by the ladies of White Sands and High Bank who generously contributed towards this part of the entertainment and helped to make it a financial success, as the sum of \$40, or upwards was realized. Without specializing reference might also be made to some of the patriotic young men of Little Sands, who, realizing that music and recitations alone is poor food for the starving Belgians, cheerfully "dug deep down in their pockets." One young man, in particular bought a half-dozen pies, and judging by his liberality, had he possessed an aeroplane, no doubt he would have distributed the pies in person to the unfortunate Belgians.

CANADA'S NEW WAR LOAN FOR \$100,000,000 WILL BE LAUNCHED IN MARCH.

OTTAWA, February 16.—Another domestic war loan will be called for by the government in March. No information can yet be given as to its amount but it is unofficially understood that it will be for \$100,000,000. The terms and price of the loan will not be stated until immediately before the issue is made. Sir Thomas White has the assurance of the earnest co-operation of the financial committee and of the bond dealers and brokers whose activity and enterprise contributed materially to the success of the last loan. It is probably that the securities of the new loan will be made payable both in Canada and in New York.

NO ROUMANIAN FOOD FOR HUNGARY AUSTRIAN PEOPLE

LONDON, Feb. 16.—Austrian papers announce that the first consignments of Rumanian grain have arrived at the Hungarian border, this being the first Rumanian booty that has fallen to Austria. But, adds the papers all has been requisitioned for the army, or sent to Germany, and the papers complain bitterly that the government has again yielded to Germany.
