Urge Measures To Combat Spread Of Venereal Diseases

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)
OTTAWA, May 27.—A plan for national measures to combat the spread of venereal diseases, especially syphilis, was made in the House of Commons today by Dr. J. P. Howden (Lib. St. Boniface) when Health Department estimates were under consideration.

Syphilis affected more people than tuberculosis, it sent many to insane asylums and was responsible for a great part of the insanity in Canada and other countries. It could be stamped out for the prevalence of the disease varied greatly in countries with varying programs against it.

The National Health Department was really established to carry on a fight against the disease. No other conclusion could be reached, Dr. Howden thought, than that Canada should re-establish its whole health program "which has been pushed almost entirely off the statute books."

"If no leadership comes from the Federal Department what can we expect from the provinces? Federal authorities have the power and the resources."

"I appeal to the Government and people of this country to agitate and see that we have a wholesome and healthy department of public health in Canada."
