FORMER ISLANDER.—The following from the Syracuse, N. Y. Post Standard, of Monday, October 6, will be read with interest in Mrs. McInnis' home town.—Rev. Dr. John Murdoch MacInnis was installed last night as pastor of the South Presbyterian church in the place of Rev. Murray Shipley Howland, resigned. More than 800 persons attended the service, which was held at the church. Prior to the public ceremony an adjourned meeting of the Presbytery was held, at which Dr. MacInnis was accepted. The service opened with a short musical program of organ prelude in two parts and the Doxology. The invocation and Lord's prayer were then offered by Rev. Samuel W. Steele, D. D. of Oswego, as moderator. Dr. Steele also read the Scripture lesson and put the constitutional questions. Rev. Walter Rockwood Ferris, pastor of Park Presbyterian Church, gave the address, and the charge to the new pastor was delivered by Rev. Dr. Albert C. Fulton, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church. Mr. Howland made the charge to the people. The prayer of installation was offered by Rev. John N. Steele, and the benediction was pronounced by the new pastor. The vestry choir sang two anthems and two hymns by the congregation joining the latter. The program closed with an organ postlude sonata No. IV, Manuetto, from Guilman. An informal reception was held at the close of the service, when the new pastor was given an opportunity to greet his parishioners. The clergymen who had taken part in the services received with him. ISLANDERS ABROAD.—The following which will be of interest to many islanders is taken from an exchange.—Former residents of the Maritime Provinces, of which there are about three thousand residing in Calgary, held an evening's entertainment at Paget hall on Thursday evening when an interesting program consisting of vocal and instrumental music, short addresses, readings and stereoscopic pictures of beauty spots in the Maritime Provinces, was put on. The hall was crowded. During the evening a series of nearly one hundred Maritime Provinces views were shown. Mr. T. B. Kidner showed the New Brunswick views, a score or more of which had been loaned to the Association by the New Brunswick Government, and others by Mr. Chas. Whittaker, formerly of Fredericton, N. B., now of Calgary. Mr. J. A. Irvine, looked after Nova Scotia views, and Rev. A. D. Macdonald handled those from Prince Edward Island. The gentlemen accompanied the views with entertaining remarks descriptive of the scenery. The Maritime Provinces Association was organized here a few days ago chiefly through the efforts of Messrs. R. B. Bennett, K. C.; J. A. Irvine and J. G. VanWart, and has connected with it by membership and otherwise about fifty hundred persons in the city. Among the islanders present were—Bishop McNally, Rev. A. D. Macdonald, Rev. Dr. A. B. McDonald and Dr. Coffin. The latter was appointed vice president of the association for P. E. Islands.

WORTHY CITIZENS.—Three very large men were together in the city Wednesday, and a very gentlemanly one as to which was the heaviest. The parties were Messrs. J. J. Davis of Charlottetown, George W. C. Oland of Halifax and Mr. Ed. Crosby, Cape Traverse. After some discussion, it was decided—the only way to settle the matter would be to measure each man's height and take the weight. Mr. Davis tipped the scale at 277 pounds, Mr. Oland at 261, and Mr. Crosby at 255—total weight for the three being 793. The men were of the same height—exactly six feet tall. They are all in the best of health, fine, congenial men and good Canadians.

PLANT LINE.—Mr. James Caragrange, Agent of the Plant Line, Charlottetown, received the following telegram last night: "Gale continues; had; absolutely necessary to cancel going east this trip, in order to make sure of keeping next week's sailing." The S. S. Perry leaves Halifax for Boston Saturday night. The telegram is from Mr. H. L. Chipman, Eastern Manager of the Plant Line. This means that there will be no Plant Line steamer sailing from Charlottetown to-day. The next sailing from this port will therefore be on Friday, the 21st instant.

THE WALTER LOWE CASE.—The evidence which is being submitted to an arbitration Court in the well-known and long-standing case of Walter Lowe against the Government, for the recovery of pecuniary compensation and damages in regard to a contract which had been made with him for the construction of a wing to Falconwood Asylum, but which had never been carried out by him, is now being brought to a termination. A considerable amount of evidence has been led both on the part of the claimant and the Government. Among the witnesses examined was Mr. A. B. Warburton, a former Premier of the local Parliament, who held office during a portion of the period when the dispute between Mr. Lowe and the Government was at its height, some fifteen or sixteen years ago. Mr. C. B. Chappell, the architect who made the original plans for the Asylum annex which Mr. Lowe claims were approved and were the cause of the dispute which ended in his being deprived of the contract, is now giving evidence.

AUCTION SALE.—A large auction sale at the farm of Mr. George McKenzie, Hillsborough, was conducted on Monday last and was a great success. Everything sold exceedingly well and Mr. McKenzie was greatly pleased with the receipts. The day being damp and unfit for much work by the farmers, a large number of people attended. Cattle sold from \$25 to \$50 each, horses from \$145 to \$200 each and everything else accordingly. The auction was conducted by Messrs. B. Carter & Co., Charlottetown, who are noted for their successful success as auctioneers. Mr. McKenzie, who is one of the most progressive farmers of Hillsborough leaves for British Columbia on Tuesday morning. He will be greatly missed in his native community, but his many friends will wish him well in his new field, where he will doubtless attain success.
