COMMODITY EXPORT ADVANCES

OTTAWA, Dec. 10 (CP) — Canada's commodity export trade during the third month of the war continued the advancing tendency which has been feature of the foreign trade since the start of 1939, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics said Saturday. The value of November exports totalled \$7,233,800, compared with \$5,979,453 in November, 1938. The total for the first 11 months of this year advanced to \$823,980,256 from \$769,996,252 in the corresponding period last year.

Minor League Baseball Plans Collapse

By Judson Bretley Associated Press Staff Writer CINCINNATI, Dec. 8 (AP) — Weeks of maneuvering by baseball's minor leagues to bring legislation that would relax restrictions on the big farm systems collapse today in 40 minutes. Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis is simply said, "no."

The commissioner czar of baseball, gathered the 16 club owners of the National and American Leagues before him in joint meeting and read off the amendments proposed by the minor leagues to pry him off his lofty perch.

There was the one that would keep an entire farm system from being bound by a player-transfer rule that refers to only one club; there was another that would permit scouts to sign players for affiliated clubs, and another that would prohibit the rules from being interpreted.

After each the National League voted "yes" and the American League voted "no." Then Landis would solemnly declare, "the commissioner votes 'no.'"

Before the session was more than well started, President Larry MacPhail of Brooklyn Dodgers and a prime backer of the movement to curb the commissioner, stalked from the room in a rage. There was a report also that President Ed Barrow of the New York Yankees was angered at his own league's stand.

President William G. Braham of the minor leagues announced that the efforts of the National Association to gain greater freedom for the chain system would continue unabated.

But the fact remained that the stormy 1939 winter meetings ended with Commissioner Landis unshaken in his hold and views on the conduct of baseball.

As the convention broke up, there was a flurry of trading in secondary paying talent as the managers finally decided to put through deals they had been hounding to better. None were of great moment.

The series of swaps started shortly after midnight with Chicago White Sox sending outfielder Gee Walker to Washington for outfielder Taft Wright and pitcher Pete Appleton. During the day, the Sox also sold infielder Marv Owen to Boston Red Sox and traded outfielder Igo Radcliffe to St. Louis Browns for outfielder Julius Gollers.

NASSAU, Bahamas, Dec. 9 (CP) — While the Empire tightens its belt in one way or another for the war with Germany, the battle cry of the Bahamas Islands colony is "peace, plenty and pleasure galore."

Most of the fun, however, is for the tourists whose cash will swell the island colony's contribution to the Empire's war chest.

Behind the scenes the island government and the islands are bending all their energies to provide new attractions calculated to catch some of the overflow of American winter vacationists who have been cut off from European resorts by the war.

The government is now rushing to completion a new air field for the convenience of wealthy fliers who can make the hop from the Florida mainland in less than two hours. Heretofore, accommodation had only been made for amphibian planes.

A new series of yacht races has been arranged for December by the Royal Nassau Sailing Club for the captain's prize presented by Lady Oakes, wife of Sir Harry Oakes, Canadian mining millionaire, who is one of the top planners in the island government.

Early in December a new 18-hole championship golf course will be formally opened when Sir Harry and three other prominent government officials play an inaugural foursome. International swimming races have been arranged, horse racing opens in January and the cast of the Paris seasons sports for the tourist will include polo, rugby, cricket and tennis.

All in all the Bahamas are going to fight an entertaining war.

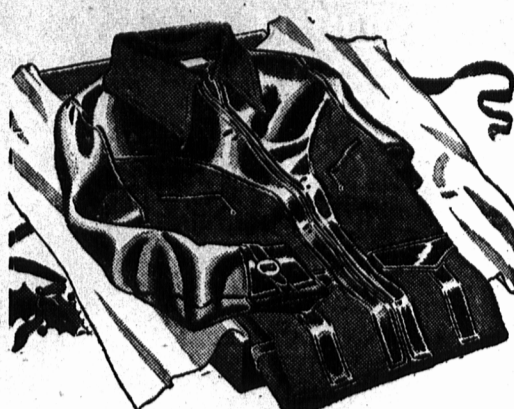
TURKEY NOTES
