COMPENSATION.

Shakespeare put in the mouth of one of his characters the sentiment, "There is some soul of goodness in things evil; thus our bad neighbors make us early stirrers, which is both useful and good husbandry." It may be a good time for the people of our Province and City to apply the same philosophy to the occurrences of the past few months—the broken cable, the ice-blockade of the winter steamers, the stoppage of travel, delay of mails, hardships of the strap service, the outbreak of smallpox, the closed churches, schools and pleasure resorts, and so on.

A little reflection will show us that the earliest settlers of our Island had very few of the things of which we have been deprived and yet were perhaps quite as happy as we are. They had no cable, or telegraph, or telephone; no railway, no roads, even, but a blazed path through the forest; no churches or schools, or public halls, or skating rinks, or toboggan slides, or bridge parties, or hockey matches. And yet, from what we can learn of them they were quite as healthful, contented and happy as the people of today.

We would not like to go back to those primitive conditions. We feel the deprivation of luxuries cut off and privileges abridged. But if we apply the comfortable maxim of Shakespeare above quoted, we may find a measure of compensation in even those things we most complain of. The broken cable—well in the fever of stock speculation a few years ago, how many hundred dollars would it not have been worth to our city had the Telegraph service ceased for three months! The ice blockade, if it is only long enough, must at length move the Government and Parliament, for very shame's sake, to give us the Tunnel.

Interrupted mails at least save us something in postage. The smallpox gives business to the doctors, the closed churches give the preachers a rest which they will no doubt turn to account by giving us fresher and more vigorous sermons hereafter. Teachers and pupils will during the recess get more of fresh air than in the stuffy school-rooms. The closed rinks, theatres and halls will save the cost of admission to various pastimes. Possibly some who have been tempted abroad too much in search of pleasure, may learn in the interim to find renewed interest, happiness and duty in the home circle.

After all our real wants are few; thousands of things we think we need can be dispensed with at comparatively little inconvenience. Robinson Crusoe on his lone island was happier than most of the pampered millionaires. We have to go back to the days before civilization had multiplied the wants of our race to find the golden age, and still farther to find the Eden of the first happy pair. Something of Crusoe's or Shakespeare's philosophy applied to our present circumstances may enable us to rest reasonably content even during the ice-blockade, with the east wind blowing, the smallpox in our midst and the Legislature in session.

On a motion by a private member the British House of Commons by a vote of 108 to 90 resolved in favor of disestablishing the established Church in both England and Wales. It surely is highly significant that such a motion should pass the Commons by such a majority. Of course, the resolution will have no immediate effect, but it is a timely notice that disestablishment and disendowment cannot be very long delayed.

THE LORD'S DAY ACT.

The Dominion Lord's Day Act passed at last session of the Canadian Parliament, came into force on 1st March. It makes little change in our Province, because its provisions, although generally somewhat less strict than our own provincial act, leave our former law still in force. This is made clearly by section 14, which reads as follows:

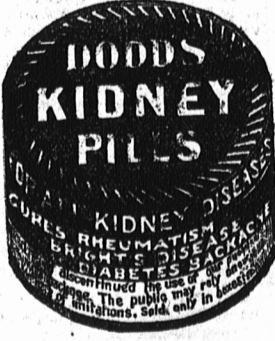
14. Nothing herein shall be construed to repeal or in any way affect any provision of any act or law relating in any way to the observance of the Lord's Day in force in any Province of Canada when this act comes into force; and where any person violates any of the provisions of this act, and such offence is also a violation of any other act or law, the offender may be proceeded against either under the provisions of this act or under the provisions of any other act or law applicable to the offence charged.

It is only in Ontario and the Provinces farther west that the new law will be in any respect more stringent than the laws before in force. Quebec has its own statutory provisions permitting many things there to be done on Sunday in the way of amusement. The Sunday laws of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, which, like our own, remain in force, are generally more restrictive than the new federal law.

Probably never before in a single winter have so many persons in Canada perished from cold and exposure as during the past few months. Accounts of such tragedies have come not only from the Northwest but from Ontario, Quebec, and from each of the Maritime Provinces. The severity of the winter has been remarkable.

A hundred passengers out in the ice on the Minto, and the steamer has sleeping accommodation for twenty-seven, says The Patriot. The same journal opens its columns to such correspondents as "Ram-ble" to swear at the "fairy tunnel." If the Liberal party can afford to have its organ take this course it must indeed be confident of its strength and of the people's patience.

The St. John Globe calls attention to the fact that of ten Governors in New Brunswick since confederation not one has been of the Roman Catholic faith. In other Provinces where the Catholic population is not proportionately so large as in New Brunswick there has been no disposition to be so exclusive. Saint John, too, has been very careful that its Mayor should be a Protestant. The eight Premiers of New Brunswick since confederation and those from time immemorial before include no Roman Catholic names. All of which is remarkable in a Province where 125,000 out of 300,000 people are of Roman Catholic faith. It is not a wholesome rule which either promotes or excludes from office any person because of his creed.



There seems to be a good many complaints of the Ross rifle, which the Militia Department has at great cost adopted for arming the Canadian militia. In a number of cases the annual rifle practice last year was discontinued because of defects in the new arm. The Mounted Police in many cases reported the new rifle unsatisfactory.

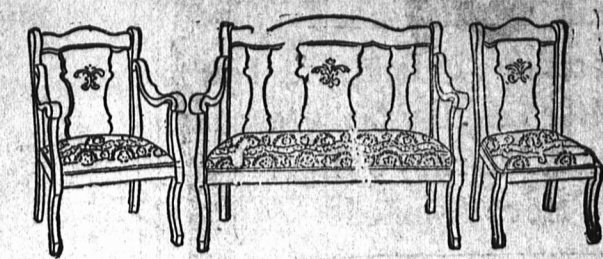
